
## **Christmas Crossword**

The name of the winner and solution to the competition will appear in the April 1995 issue of the *Psychiatric Bulletin*.



#### Clinic for tuberous sclerosis sufferers

Tuberous sclerosis is a common multi-system genetic disorder. Symptoms may include epilepsy, learning difficulties, challenging behaviour, autism, a characteristic facial rash, renal problems, and tumours in any organ of the body. The Cambridge Tuberous Sclerosis Clinic was opened on 6 October 1994 and will combine expertise in diagnosis and treatment of both the behavioural problems as well as genetic aspects of the condition.
