#### Grants for conservation field research

The Lincoln Park Zoo Scott Neotropic and Africa/Asia Funds support field research in conservation biology around the world. The Scott Neotropic fund focuses on projects undertaken in Latin America and the Caribbean. The fund emphasizes the support of graduate students and other young researchers, particularly those from Latin America. Since 1986, the fund has awarded over 126 grants in 19 countries. The Africa/Asia fund, launched in 1997, focuses on projects throughout Africa, Asia and the Pacific. Each fund supports projects of young conservation biologists and between five and 15 projects for each fund are supported each year.

The fund awards are seldom greater than \$US7500, and most awards fall in the range of \$US3000–6000. Initial support is for up to 12 months from the date of award, and the maximum duration of support is 2 years. The current deadline for receipt of Scott Neotropic proposals is 1 September, and Africa/Asia proposals have no deadline for 1999. ### **Monitoring for Nature Conservation**

# Phra Thong Island Sea Turtle Project 1999-2000

Applications are being invited by CHELON, Marine Turtle Conservation and Research Program, for Research Assistants for its 1999–2000 Sea Turtle Project. The project is located at the Golden Buddha Beach Resort, Phra Thong Island, Thailand, and will run from 6 December 1999 to 20 April 2000. The deadline for completed applications is 1 October 1999 and selection of Research Assistants will be made by 15 October 1999.

Duties will include: coordinating volunteers, monitoring nesting beaches by day and night; data collection on the location of nests, nest translocation, predation and illegal harvest rates; conservation awareness activities among the local community and tourists; and fundraising.

Applicants are required to stay for a minimum of 2 months, should have a BSc in biology or a related field, or be a student in a related field, and have a working knowledge of English.
