LIBRARY OF CONGRESS.

Renaissance additions to the Hispanic collection are listed on pp. 22-23 and 30 of the Quart. Journ. of Curr. Acqu. for November 1947. Of major importance appear (1) the 1945 edition of Codex 886 in the *Biblioteca Pública do Pôrto*, a 16th century copy of a ms. originally written in the 15th century; (2) the 1944 publication of Higinio Angelés' *La Musica en la corte de Carlos V*; [ed. note: the significance of this book is discussed currently in the Musical Quarterly for Jan. 1948, p. 125 f. and in the Mus. Libr. Assn. Notes for Dec. 1947, p. 58 f. Anglés is reported to have left Spain and to have taken charge of the music library of the Vatican.]

The report of the Music Division (Quart. Journ. of Curr. Acqun., Nov. 1947, pp. 35-47) lists the outstanding accessions since 1940, among which Petrucci's *Odhecaton* of 1504 ranks first chronologically and in general interest. Milan's 1536 *Maestro*, Cottone's 1581 *madrigali*, the 1588 *canzonette* published by Peeters as well as Melvill's 1612 *roundells* (pp. 38 f., 44, of the report) have already been listed in the Autumn 1947 issue of this Newsletter (p. 4). To these the report adds five important hymn books of the German Reformation published in 1524, 1544, 1569, 1588 and 1596 respectively.

HARVARD UNIVERSITY.

Houghton Library. The 37 page printed

report of accessions for the year 1946-47 has just appeared and Renaissance items will be found listed on pp. 2-10 and 18. Among 15th century mss. there are "an Italian *Vite de Santi* . . . containing nearly 200 initials in 5 different stages of preparation from outline pen drawings to those fully gilt and painted." Also a "Florentine humanist ms. of Leonardo Bruni's *Epistolae* is important . . . for its text as containing dates for letters which are undated in the printed editions." Among the incunabula are the Redgrave copy of the *Opuscula* of St. John Chrysostom printed at Rome by Ulrich Han about 1477; the first edition of Marsilio Ficino's *De Cristiana religione* printed at Florence in 1476 containing a letter in the hand of Ficino to Nicholas Michelocletus (dated 19 October 1475); the Dyson Perrins copy of the first Malermi *Biblia vulgare istoriata*, Venice, 1490, of which the only other copy in this country is the fragment in the Metropolitan Museum; and the unique *Missale Romanum* (Naples, C. Preller for A. Gontier, c. 1490), likewise ex coll. Dyson Perrins.

YALE UNIVERSITY is in process of acquiring a collection of more than 200 Reformation Tracts including many in-

teresting items of Luther, Melanchthon, Zwingli, Erasmus and a goodly number of minor figures whose first editions are the more important because they never have been and in all likelihood never will be reprinted. A single instance of this type of material is afforded in the case of Hans Greiffenberger, a painter of Nuernberg, who was banished from the city in 1526 because as a layman he consecrated the Lord's Supper and administered it to his wife. Out of his total literary output of seven tracts, four are now in the Yale Library.

A recent gift of sixty 16th and 17th century books includes a first issue of the first edition of Lovelace's *Lucasta*, a first edition of Daniel's *Musophilus*, a translated copy of the first book of Cicero's *De Officiis*, once owned by William Wordsworth, and a copy of Fulback's *Parallel or Conference*, once owned by James Boswell.
