THE STATE AND THE ECONOMY IN THE MIDDLE NIGER VALLEY, 1700–1914

Richard L. Roberts. Over two centuries, the region of the Middle Niger valley of the Western Sudan was dominated by three successive states: the indigenous Segu Bambara, the Islamic Umerian, and the French colonial. In each state, warriors were the rulers and the survival of the state depended on an ability to reproduce its capacity to make war; in order to do so, the warrior state intervened in the economy.
