Urban Ecosystem Research

Ecosystem research focused on urban areas has become a growing trend. The National Science Foundation (NSF), a leading federal agency funding environmental research, recently added the first two urban programs—Baltimore and Phoenix—to its existing list of 18 Long-Term Ecological Research (LTER) efforts. Begun in 1980 with six sites, the Long-Term Ecological Research effort represents a commitment to the focused study of ecological change over time. The two urban programs involve new, interdisciplinary collaborations between natural and social scientists and others, drawing as much on sociologists, geographers, economists, and educators as on ecologists.

Both projects seek public assistance in monitoring and interpreting the urban environment. Urban ecosystem related discussions dominated the eighth Cary Conference, held in April 1999, at the Institute of Ecosystem Studies in Millbrook, NY. The conference is thought to be the first to bring together worldwide leaders in the biological, physical, and social dimensions of the field of urban ecosystem research with top education researchers, administrators and teachers. Scientists and educators at the conference saw the trend toward urban ecosystem research and education as an essential harbinger for a more comprehensive public understanding of cities and the web of interrelationships within and between urban areas and other ecosystems. A book growing from the this conference is planned for publication next spring.
