Cover. Two plaques $(57 \times 53mm & 47 \times 43mm)$ with linear motifs found with more than 600 whole and fragmentary engraved stones at Vasagård, on the Danish island of Bornholm. The finds are regarded as Neolithic miniature artworks and termed 'sun stones' in reference to the rayed images. It is also suggested that the engraved stones were ritually deposited at Vasagård to secure the fertility and growth of crops.
