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fter WWII, Soviet authorities used special "Trophy Brigades" to transport millions of cultural treasures to the USSR where they were held in relative secrecy until the final years of glasnost. As European countries started to demand their cultural treasures, Russian legislators passed a law that potentially nationalized all cultural treasures brought to Russia at the end of WWII. The Russian Constitutional Court issued an opinion upholding the law if amended. What are the chances for restitution? What about international law?
