We congratulate David Del Tredici on winning the 1980 Pulitzer Prize for Music with his *In Memory of a Summer Day*, premièred on 23 February in St. Louis, Missouri, by Phyllis Bryn-Julson and the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra conducted by Leonard Slatkin. The award reflects the phenomenal popular success-story of Del Tredici's series of works based on Lewis Carroll's 'Alice' books:

Pop-Pourri for amplified soprano (plus counter-tenor or mezzo-soprano ad lib), solo rock group, SATB chorus, and orchestra

Vintage Alice for amplified soprano, folk-group, and orchestra

Adventures Underground for amplified soprano, folk-group, and orchestra

An Alice Symphony for amplified soprano, folk-group, and orchestra (which can be divided into the independent works Illustrated Alice and In Wonderland; the latter includes The Lobster Quadrille, which may be performed separately, with or without voice)

Annotated Alice for amplified soprano, folk-group, and orchestra

Final Alice for amplified soprano, folk-group, and orchestra

In Memory of a Summer Day for soprano and orchestra

Happy Voices for orchestra

All in the golden afternoon for soprano and orchestra (these three works constitute the cycle Child Alice)
