Critical Essays in Australian Politics

edited by Graeme Duncan, with ten contributors

A radical critique of liberal studies in Australian politics has emerged in recent years. Political scientists, political economists and radical sociologists have contributed to its development. In this book, the themes and questions of earlier formulations of this radical critique are raised for further consideration.

The book contains original criticisms of liberal political science, these include Rowse's consideration of the inadequacies of liberal studies of political culture, Lonie's revisionist history of conservative party politics, and Higgins' study of the politics of welfare. Graeme Duncan deals with a matter of particular concern: the politics of the Australian Labor Party, whilst Grant Elliott focuses on another: the Press, which has often appeared to represent interests antagonistic to the labour movement. Political issues relating to social inequalities are also dealt with in this book, specifically in relation to social welfare, education, and the status of women and migrants.
