ADDENDUM by Clarence J. Karier

In my recent article, "John Dewey and the New Liberalism: Some Reflections and Responses," in the Winter Quarterly, 1975, footnote 45, I refer to some "puzzling characteristics" of Dewey's second memorandum as listed in the appendix of Louis L. Gerson, Woodrow Wilson and the Rebirth of Poland, 1914-1920, and then mistakenly proceed to analyze that material as part of the second memorandum. That material consists of statements from congressional leaders about the Polish vote. Gerson's book here misleads. One can mistakenly read those statements as part of Dewey's second memorandum. After further research at the Yale Archives in order to authenticate the two "preliminary memoranda" which Gerson published, I found that both exist in Box 181 folder no. 1/120 in the Col. House Collection along with a transmittal letter from Dewey himself. The second report ends with the listing of recommendations and does not include the congressional analysis of the Polish vote. I do not know the origin of the latter material. I can only say at this time that it is not part of the memorandum as it exists at Yale and therefore should not be taken as part of Dewey's memorandum.
