General Notes

INTERNATIONAL CLINIC OF OTO-RHINO-LARYNGOLOGY AND FACIO-MAXILLARY SURGERY.

An international Post-graduate Course, arranged under the direction of Dr Fernand Lemaître, was held in Paris during the summer months.

In the department of endoscopy instruction was given by Professor Chevalier Jackson and his assistants in the Bronchoscopic Clinic, Philadelphia, Dr Gabriel Tucker, and Dr Ellen J. Patterson.

The morning sessions, held at the St Louis Hospital through the kindness of Dr Lemaître, took the form of fascinating "chalk talks" conducted by Professor Jackson. With the aid of the manikin board, lantern slides and beautiful crayon pictures (to call them diagrams would be quite inadequate) he gave a masterly description of laryngoscopy, bronchoscopy, œsophagoscopy, foreign body work, and diseases of the chest in relation to endoscopy.

In the afternoon, meetings held at the École de Médecin were conducted by Dr Tucker and Dr Patterson. The class of nine members was divided into groups of three. Each team worked upon a cadaver and were thoroughly drilled in endoscopic technique, each member acting successively as operator, first assistant, and second assistant. During the second week the teams operated upon narcotised dogs, practising the recovery of foreign bodies, such as pins, tacks, staples, coins, pea-nuts and beans, removing these from the œsophagus, trachea, and bronchi.

The five British members of the class were very enthusiastic over the thoroughness of the work, the modest, straightforward clarity of the teaching of Professor Jackson and the practical and sympathetic enthusiasm of his assistants. The members retain most grateful and affectionate memories of what they owe to Dr Lemaître, Professor Chevalier Jackson, Dr Gabriel Tucker, and Dr Patterson.

We are indebted to Dr T. B. Jobson of Guildford for the above short note of the work done in the class of endoscopy.


International Conference on the Education of the Deaf, London, 1925.

The Conference was held in London from the 20th to the 25th July. The programme contained many items of great interest and importance dealing with such subjects as the Psychology of the Deaf Child, Speech and Speech Reading, and Vocational Training. Among those who contributed to its scientific work were Professor Max Goldstein of St Louis, U.S.A., and Professor Ferreri of Milan.

One of the features of the Conference was the exhibition of work from the various Educational Schools not only in the British Isles, but in the Overseas Dominions, the United States and the Continent of Europe. The exhibits typified all the grades of Handwork from the Kindergarten Classes to the finished products of the Trade Schools. They included shoemaking, carpentry, millinery, tailoring, printing, cookery and baking.
