THE CASE FOR THE WELFARE STATE

NORMAN FURNISS and TIMOTHY TILTON

The authors of this thoughtful and innovative book boldly address the genuine issues of contemporary Western society: What concrete forms should social equality and social solidarity assume? What forms should public participation in political and economic decision making take? How can individual freedoms not only be maintained but expanded in an increasingly politicised society? The first step is to shift political debate away from the arid and anachronistic discussions of the relative merits of "totalitarianism," "fascism," and "democracy," to the current problems of advanced industrial societies: bureaucratic responsiveness, citizen participation, persistent poverty. The reorientation is best accomplished, they argue, within the framework of the welfare state and its critics. They focus attention on the value of the welfare state and its attendant institutions and how they might be reformed or advanced. They combine empirical, normative, and prescriptive analyses to make explicit the implicit premises upon which the welfare state rests. Their comparative discussion of welfare provision in Britain, Sweden, and the United States is carried out within a context that illuminates society seen as a whole.
