EXTRACT FROM PREFACE:—It is a custom of piou's Muslim's to employ in their devotions a three-stringed chaplet, each string containing thirty-three beads, and each bead representing one of the "Ninety-nine beautiful names of Allah," whenever this, among many other religious uses, is made of it. I have enumerated these ninety-nine "beautiful names" and appended to each—from the point of view of an Indian Muhammedan—some illustrative legend, tradition, record, or comment, drawn from diverse Oriental sources. In this way it seemed possible to present the general spirit of Islam under a new and not unacceptable form. I have thus at length finished the Oriental Trilogy which I designed. In my "Indian Song of Songs" I sought to transfer to English poetry a subtle and lovely sanskrit idyll of the Hindu theology. In my "Light of Asia" I related the story, displayed the gentle and far reaching doctrines of that great Hindoo prince who founded Buddhism. I have tried to present here, in the simple, familiar, and credulous, but earnest spirit and manner of Islam—and from its own points of view—some of the thoughts and beliefs of the followers of the notable prophet of Arabia."

EXTRACT FROM THE PREFACE.—Amongst ideas, that of the Devil may rank as one which has taken a powerful hold on the mind of man. The present volume is directed to an examination of some of the many causes which have contributed to the construction of the ideal Devil.

It is difficult to discriminate with accuracy all the links which have formed the direct lines of descent, as each link in its turn has been a centre of radiation, a point of departure for other conceptions. It has been necessary to examine some of these collateral branches, in order to illustrate the process of divergence and point out some of the collateral relationships; and indeed the temptation to digress is great. But this has been done as little as possible, the object being, not to dogmatise on the result, but to examine the origin of a single but complex ideal, and the stages by which the result is connected with the original germs.

The Devil treated of is the modern orthodox Devil of Christian Belief. No attempt is therefore made to discuss the ideals and personifications of evil realized by other creeds, except so far as light may seem to be thrown on the history of the Christian Devil.

As to the conclusions to which the facts may point, it is for each to form his own opinion. The existence or non-existence of the Devil, his personality or abstract existence, are not the questions treated of in the pages of this work. An ideal of the Devil has existed and still exists, and the only object is to trace the origin and evolution of that ideal.

Poole, the present Librarian of the Chicago Public Library, and former Librarian of the Boston Mercantile and Athenæum Libraries, whilst a student of Yale College, over thirty years ago, recognised, even at that date, the great need of an Index to Periodical Literature. From the meagre materials then within his reach, he compiled one which appeared in 1848, and enlarged in 1853. Thirty years is a long time in our particular epoch. The best thought of the day now makes its first appearance in this department, which is yearly and with rapid strides increasing in extent and importance. A glance at the list of writers for the leading reviews and magazines in any year will show the names of the best writers of the time—Historians, Scientists, Poets, Essayists, Novelists. In 1876, Mr. Poole associated himself with Mr. W. I. Fletcher, Assistant-Librarian of the Walkinson Library, Hartford, and with the active co-operation and assistance of many members of the Library Association of the United Kingdom, and of the American Library Association, undertook the preparation of the above announced Third Edition. Two Hundred and Forty Periodicals are included, embracing nearly the whole list of English and American Magazines and Reviews for the Present Century, coming down to January, 1882. The number of Volumes indexed exceeds 6,000. More than 250,000 slips have had to be alphabetically arranged.
