EXPANDING THE BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES DIVISION

The Editorial Board of this peer-reviewed journal wishes in future numbers to expand the proportion of published material devoted to the Biological Sciences. A growing number of original investigations, both in a clinical setting and from basic cell biology laboratories, deals with biomedical topics of great interest to the readership of this Journal. As yet, there is no Canadian counterpart to the federally supported National Institute of Aging south of the border, the specific mandate of which is to promote research pertinent to the physiological changes of normal aging and those medical disorders the unravelling of which is especially dependent upon such knowledge.

Medical scientists already working in this vital field therefore have a unique opportunity to foster a more receptive Canadian environment for the furtherance of such funding support, by publishing some of our work in our own literature. In addition to this general call for full manuscripts appropriate for this purpose, serious consideration is also being given to devoting a Special Issue of the Canadian Journal of Aging to biological topics, and to some Invited Reviews of currently important themes.

Research on biomedical facets of aging is finally coming of age in this country. To paraphrase the ancient sage Hillel, "If we are not for ourselves, who will be for us?"
