Youthful Davids throughout the region fought to unseat a continent of authoritarian Goliaths backed by the U.S. military and economic forces. The photograph of three guerrilleros in simple wire mesh masks bending down to pick up stones transmits the unequivocal attitude and the asymmetry of the power: stones against rifles, Molotov cocktails against tanks, the improvisational tactics of the disempowered against the strategies and territorial control of the armed forces. Meiselas' photos not only captured the hope for freedom and cultural agency, they enacted it. Powerful, break-away social actors, they came into being, inserted themselves into the socio-political context, and helped constitute a vision of a new, more humane, future. For those of us on the Left who grew up with these images in Latin America in the late 1970s, they served not simply as evidence of what had been but, as important, a promise of what could be.
