We understand that the object is to secure better work at the Sections by giving each of them a meeting every two or three years instead of annually. Oto-laryngologists are welcome to contribute communications to the surgical or other sections, and we trust that many of our readers will avail themselves of this opportunity.

It is hoped and expected that many visitors from the provinces, the over-seas Dominions and foreign countries will attend the Summer Congress in London and go on to the meeting in Cambridge.




A NEW HEAD LAMP.

A TONGUE HOLDER & DEPRESSOR for Tonsillectomy. Suggested by JAMES DONELAN, Ch.M., M.B.


