LIBRARIES

Education and World Affairs has established a Data Bank which will provide rapid and up-to-date answers to questions about the international dimensions of higher education in the United States. So far, it has processed a total of 2,185 programs at 522 U.S. universities and colleges. The information was obtained through questionnaires sent to the institutions, and is punched on EDP cards which can then be used to print selective inventories based on such variables as type of program, subject-matter, field, foreign country involved, and sources of funding. Examples of the type of analyses made possible by the data bank appeared in the February issues of EWA's publication, Intercultural Education. A tabular summary indicated that of the 2,185 programs, 408 involved study abroad for an academic year, and 405 comprised language and area studies. Of the latter, the largest numbers focus on Latin America (30.1%) and Asia (27.7%). EWA is a private, non profit organization largely funded by the Ford Foundation and Carnegie Corporation of New York.
