Submission of manuscripts

The International Review of the Red Cross invites submissions of manuscripts on subjects relating to international humanitarian law, policy and action. Issues focus on particular topics, decided by the Editorial Board, which can be consulted under the heading 'Future Themes' on the website of the Review. Submissions related to these themes are particularly welcome.

Articles may be submitted in Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish. Selected submissions are translated into English if necessary.

Submissions must not have been published, submitted or accepted elsewhere. Articles are subjected to a peer-review process. The final decision on publication is taken by the Editor-in-Chief. The Review reserves the right to edit articles. Notification of acceptance, rejection or the need for revision will be given within 6–8 weeks of receipt of the manuscript. Manuscripts will not be returned to the authors.

Manuscript requirements

Articles should be 7,000 to 10,000 words in length. Shorter contributions can be published under the section 'Comments and opinions' or 'Selected articles on IHL and humanitarian action'.
