Submission of manuscripts. Electronic versions of papers should be submitted online at <https://www.cambridge.org/bci> or, in exceptional circumstances, via email to bcieditor@bto.org. Please follow the guidelines in the Instructions for Authors.

Proofs. The corresponding author will receive, by email, page proofs for checking which they are required to return within three days of receipt. Textual changes in proof cannot normally be countenanced and the publisher reserves the right to charge authors for excessive correction of non-typographical errors.
