Operation Scimitar Oryx

By 1990 scimitar-horned oryx may be extinct. Once spread throughout North Africa from the Nile to the Atlantic, now less than 2000 survive in scattered populations in Mali, Niger and Chad.

Despite their small numbers they are still hunted, especially where they compete with livestock for grazing; and in Chad, their stronghold, they may soon be exterminated because of the civil war there.

So FFPS started OPERATION SCIMITAR ORYX to save the oryx. John Newby, who has worked with them in the West African desert, is surveying the Termit area in Niger, aided by WWF, Marwell Preservation Trust and the Zoological Society of London, and preparing plans for a scimitar-horned oryx reserve.

Eventually, zoo-bred oryx from Britain will be taken to a breeding compound in Niger and their progeny will be released in the reserve.

THE GREAT APES OF AFRICA

This book represents the proceedings of a conference held in the luxurious new laboratories of the Centre International de la Recherche Medicale de Franceville, Gabon, W. Africa in December 1979 to review in depth the present state of knowledge about the three great apes of Africa, the gorilla, the chimpanzee and the pygmy chimpanzee. Many of the world's leading primatologists were present, and this Supplement presents a unique multi-disciplinary account of the reproductive physiology and behaviour of gorillas and chimpanzees in the wild; these patterns are then compared to those seen in captive animals. Conflicting viewpoints are expressed about the chromosomal evolution of man and the great apes, and much new endocrinological information is presented on puberty, the menstrual cycle and pregnancy in these species. The volume concludes with a discussion of the diseases of the great apes in captivity, and a review of the inheritance of their blood groups.

Gabon was the country in which the gorilla was first discovered by white man, as recently as 1847, and yet already the very existence of the gorilla and the chimpanzee is severely threatened in all their natural habitats throughout Africa; they may well be exterminated before the end of this century. This book therefore demands to be read by all who have an interest in human and primate evolution, or who are concerned with conservation in the wild or keeping great apes in captivity. It should also serve as a challenge to the conscience of scientists engaged in research on these endangered species, man's closest living relatives, whose demise would be an irreparable loss to Science and Humanity.




