NOTES TO CONTRIBUTORS

1. Articles should be typed in double spacing on A4 paper and on one side of the paper only.
2. Quotations in Latin and Greek should be kept reasonably short; Greek words and phrases may be transliterated. Passages from classical authors should normally be offered either in or with translations.
3. Quotations in English, Latin, French, etc., should be put in single inverted commas, e.g., ... the phrase 'dux famina facti' has ...
A quotation within a quoted passage has double inverted commas. Single words or self-contained phrases (such as *fait accompli*) may be underlined to indicate italics. Material inserted within a quotation is placed in square brackets:
'[The translator] ... must ever be casting his eyes upwards from the the copy to the original'.

4. References should normally be given in the footnotes, in the following form:

R. Syme, *The Roman Revolution* (Oxford, 1939), 77 ff. or Syme (n. 7), 77 ff.

E. Norden, *Die antike Kunstprosa* i.165 ff. or Norden (n. 7), i.165 ff.

F. Jacoby, *FGrHist* 328 F 4.

Author's initials should be stated, at least at their first mention.

Abbreviations should not be assigned to books unless they are generally familiar (e.g. *OCD* omitting full points).

ARTICLES

J. P. Winnington-Ingram. 'The Danaid Trilogy', *JHS* 81 (1961), 141 ff.

Both year and volume number should be given. Abbreviations may follow the style of Marouzeau's *L'Année philologique*.

ANCIENT AUTHORITIES

Aristophanes, *Birds* 135.

Homer, *Od.*, 1.1 (not α 1).

Cic. *Phil.* 2.20.

Quint. 10.1.46.

Soph. *O.C.* 225 (retain full points; don not use l. or ll., but, where necessary, line(s)).

BC (BCE) should appear after, AD before (or CE after), the number of that year. The following should not be italicized: op. cit., loc. cit., cf., ibid.

5. Manuscripts submitted by contributors will *not* be returned, and contributors are requested to submit photocopies.
6. **Copyright:** It is a condition of publication in the Journal that authors assign copyright to Oxford University Press. This ensures that requests from third parties to reproduce articles are handled efficiently and consistently and will also allow the article to be as widely disseminated as possible. In assigning copyright, contributors may use their own material in other publications provided that the Journal is acknowledged as the original place of publication, and Oxford University Press is notified in writing and in advance.

THE CLASSICAL ASSOCIATION

The Classical Association has a worldwide membership and is open to all who value the study of the languages, literature, and civilizations of ancient Greece and Rome. It creates opportunities for friendly exchange and co-operation among classicists, encourages scholarship through its journals and other publications, and supports classics in schools and universities. Every year it holds an annual conference, and it sponsors branches all over the country which put on programmes of lectures and other activities.

The Classical Association has about 3,500 members. The annual subscription is £10; life membership is £105 for those aged 65 or over. Members receive the Presidential Address once a year and a newsletter, *CA News*, twice a year. They may also subscribe at substantially reduced cost to the Classical Association journals *Classical Quarterly*, *Classical Review*, and *Greece & Rome*.
