Along with annotations to all five chapters of The Gift, the commentary provides insight into

problems of paleography, featuring unique textological analysis of the novel based on the author's study of the archival copy of the manuscript.



Manuscripts for consideration should be submitted by post or courier in three double-spaced copies. Notes and block quotations should also be double-spaced; notes should be placed at the end of the manuscript and not at the bottom of the page. Library of Congress transliteration and the *Chicago Manual of Style* are to be followed. Submitted manuscripts may use either the humanities style (endnotes) or the author-date-bibliography system, though accepted articles will need to be revised to conform to *Slavic Review's* house style. Manuscripts are sent to outside readers in anonymous form and should be prepared accordingly.

In general, articles should not exceed 8,000 words, excluding notes. Please indicate the word count on the cover page of the manuscript. Accepted manuscripts will be copyedited electronically, and authors will be asked to submit an electronic version. Submissions will not be returned.

The policy of *Slavic Review* is not to consider materials that have been published in any form or language or that are being considered for publication elsewhere. *Slavic Review* is the journal of the Association for Slavic, East European, and Eurasian Studies, whose members support the journal through their dues. *Slavic Review* expects the authors of articles published in the journal to belong to the association.




