The California Institute of International

#### ART EXHIBITIONS

The first San Juan Biennial was held in Puerto Rico through March 15, 1970, it included 700 graphic works by 180 artists from Latin America and the Caribbean, and featured the first comprehensive showing of graphics of Orozco and a one-man show of Lorenzo Homar. Organizing committee included Luigi Marrozzini, director of the Colibri Gallery in San Juan, and William S. Lieberman, director of the Museum of Modern Art.

An Exhibition of Huichol Indian Art from Mexico was held at the Los Angeles County Museum of Natural History from March 18 to July 27, 1969, organized by Peter Furst of the UCLA Latin American Center. It featured more than fifty large yarn paintings illustrating Huichol mythology, as well as Huichol embroidery, weaving, and ceremonial art, from the collections of UCLA Museum and Laboratories of Ethnic Arts and Technology and the American Museum of Natural History, as well as the personal collection of Dr. and Mrs. Furst. The loan objects from the American Museum were collected in the Huichol country in 1895 by Carl Lumholtz, pioneer in Huichol field ethnography.

#### Second Edition, Revised The Mexican Revolution

Federal Expenditure and Social Change since 1910 James W. Wilkie

This book won the Herbert E. Bolton prize for the best book on Latin American subjects in 1967.
