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## A CHALLENGE

MEMBERS are reminded that from the beginning the Institute has encouraged the formation of Local Centres. In those cities possessing a University or University College, it is suggested that members living in the vicinity should form a group and approach a member of the teaching staff of the department of philosophy to act as their guide and leader in the study of Philosophy. In places where there is no University, it is suggested that Reading Circles should be formed and competent leaders elected. It is well to remember that there are excellent commentaries on many of the great classics in philosophy.

For these enterprises it is essential that energetic members of the Institute in various places should take upon themselves the task of organizing such Local Centres and Study Circles. Before the war there were active Centres in Bangor, Cardiff, Liverpool, Manchester, Newcastle, Durham, and Sheffield, but recently they have not all been functioning, and there is room for expansion.

The members of the Institute are scattered throughout Britain. Intending organizers of Local Centres will, on request, be supplied with the names and addresses of members living in their neighbourhood.
