## THE BRITISH INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL AND COMPARATIVE LAW

THE British Institute of International and Comparative Law was founded in 1958 to bring together and expand the work of The Society of Comparative Legislation and International Law (founded in 1894) and the Grotius Society (founded in 1915). The Institute provides a centre for studying the practical application to current problems of public international law, private international law and comparative law (with particular reference to Commonwealth law and the legal problems of the European Communities). The Institute organises meetings and conferences, conducts and promotes research and publishes The International and Comparative Law Quarterly and its periodical Supplements.

The Institute is organised under a Council of Management, of which the Chairman is The Rt. Hon. Lord Denning. There is also an Advisory Board, with Public International Law, Comparative Law and Private International Law Sections, the respective Chairmen of these Sections being The Rt. Hon. Lord Shawcross, Q.C., The Rt. Hon. Lord Justice Diplock and The Hon. Mr. Justice Karminski. The Director of the Institute is Norman S. Marsh.

Membership of the Institute is open to individuals, firms and corporations without restriction of nationality for an annual membership fee of £4 4s. (including the International and Comparative Law Quarterly and its Supplements). Larger firms and corporations are invited to become "corporate subscribers" at a fee of £52 10s. per annum, with certain advantages regarding participation in conferences. Those in the United Kingdom who are studying for call to the Bar or for admission as solicitors, may join the Institute at a reduced rate of £2 2s. per annum, and may claim this privilege for three years after call or admission.
