### REHABILITATION OF HEARING IMPAIRED ADULTS A COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH

### SUITABLE FOR MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS, AUDIOLOGICAL SCIENTISTS, HEARING THERAPISTS AND THOSE IN RELATED FIELDS

27, 28 and 29 May, 1981

THE lectures and demonstrations will be given by the staff of the Department of Auditory Rehabilitation of the Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital and a number of visiting lecturers including Professor David Goldstein of Purdue University, U.S.A.

The curriculum will be based on a comprehensive model for the process of audiological rehabilitation recently developed within this Department.

This model aims to integrate the evaluation and remediation processes of rehabilitation. It emphasizes the importance of non-instrumental factors, particularly the patient's attitude. The rehabilitation approach based on this model involves a combination of non-instrumental and instrumental factors to provide the best rehabilitation for each individual patient. The details and value of such an approach will be illustrated by case studies and video recorded presentations. The aim of the course is to teach those attending how to use the model to improve their daily practice.

### 1981 CLINICAL AUDIOLOGY COURSE

THE next Clinical Audiology Course is planned by the Audiology Group of ISVR during the period 30 March to 3 April 1981. The course is intended primarily for specialists in otolaryngology and trainees in the speciality and will consist of lectures and demonstrations of the latest audiological and vestibulo-metric techniques. The subjects covered are as follows:—

The patient with a conductive hearing loss The patient with a sensorineural hearing loss The medico-legal case The dizzy patient The patient with central auditory dysfunction Paedo-audiology

The course is approved by the Council for Postgraduate Medical Education in England and Wales under its advanced postgraduate training scheme.

To prevent overcrowding of demonstrations, it is necessary to limit the number, and early reservation of a provisional place is therefore advised.

The fees, not yet finalised, will be in the region of £195 non-residential (inclusive of comprehensive lecture notes, all meals daily and the special course dinner). Help will be offered in finding suitable hotel accommodation and if there is sufficient interest, it would be possible to get student accommodation at a hall of residence within walking distance of the University. Current cost for dinner, bed and breakfast in a hall of residence is £11.00.
