

1. Articles should usually be less than 9000 words, including endnotes and a 100-word abstract. Texts should be double-spaced throughout and on one side of the paper only, with generous margins and submitted by email as Word files to *each* of the Editors and the Editorial Assistant. The tile page should indicate the word-length of the article and affiliation and contact address of the author(s). Comments on previously published articles will also be considered, provided they do not exceed 1500 words.

2. Endnotes should be numbered consecutively through the manuscript and typed *double-spaced* on separate pages at the end. Bibliographical references should be given in full in the endnotes when first cited; thereafter use author surname and short title.

3. Maps and graphs (figures) and tables should be submitted in separate files, and the text annotated to indicate where they should be placed. Figures should be submitted as tif or eps files. Electronic Figure Guidelines can be obtained from the Editorial Assistant.

4. British conventions for spelling and punctuation are followed.

5. The Editors reserve the right to request authors to meet the costs of major correction to the English that they consider necessary after the articles have been reviewed and resubmitted by the authors.

6. Authors of articles published in the journal assign copyright to Cambridge University Press (with certain rights reserved).
