An egalitarian might grudgingly accept a Rawlsian basic structure that incentivizes productivity for the sake of the least advantaged. However, G. A. Cohen held, a sincere egalitarian cannot simply leave it at that. Sincere egalitarian commitment is personal, not merely political. Sincere egalitarians would personally decline incentive payments. Of course, such behavior is not what Cohen observed—even in his own case. Where does that leave egalitarianism?

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
