While most of central Beirut was reconstructed by the company Solidere, owned by former Lebanese Prime Minister Rafiq Al-Hariri, these scars were still visible two decades after the end of the war. I visited Lebanon multiple times between 1996 and 2010, being in particular interested in understanding the dynamics of the post-war settlement, especially considering its parallels to Bosnia and Herzegovina. This picture reflects the enduring visibility of war-time damage, both physically and socially, as well as the beauty of pre-war Beirut, which was not just destroyed during the war, but afterwards, by a building boom that paid little attention to urban structure and architectural heritage.
