Fifth International African Seminar: The Influence of Islam in Tropical Africa

The first in the second series of International African Seminars on 'The Influence of Islam in Tropical Africa' was held at Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria, from 1 to 8 January 1964. Papers had been prepared and considered in advance by the eighteen participants who came to the meeting from various parts of Africa and from overseas. A number of observers from Nigerian and other universities also took part in the discussions. After a general comparative review of the introduction of Islam in different regions of Africa, sessions were devoted to the consideration of: reactions to Islam in different forms of African societies; the agents of Islamization in different areas and periods; the political significance of Islamization in different regions; the effects of Islam on social rights and obligations; the interaction and combination of indigenous and Islamic beliefs and observances. A concluding session reviewed the position of Islam in the contemporary situation with reference to Western education, economic development, national and Pan-African aspirations. The papers presented to the Seminar together with a review of the discussions by the rapporteur, Dr. I. M. Lewis, are being prepared for publication.

The Institute is again indebted to the Ford Foundation which made a grant to meet the expenses of the meeting. It also extends its thanks to the Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Norman Alexander, for receiving the seminar at Ahmadu Bello University, and to Mr. A. H. M. Kirk-Greene of its School of Administration for generously undertaking the local arrangements at very short notice.
