Some of the items in this issue arise directly from questions encountered when talking to teachers in university or polytechnic Modern Languages departments. A new language laboratory including computers with access to dictionaries and databases on CD-ROM via a network might sound too good to be true - some people assert that it is. The CTICML grapevine tells me that, if anyone can solve the problems associated with networking CD-ROMs, Tim Hooton can, hence his article here. Another recurring theme is that it seems that many teachers in higher education would like to exploit the advantages of the French Minitel system in their teaching, but few have been successful. This is an area where the experience of the secondary sector is highly relevant: the reprint from the National Council for Educational Technology's Information Sheet on Minitel may well prove useful.

The report entitled 'Which Software?' analyses the responses to the questionnaire which was distributed towards the end of 1991. Thanks to all those who sent in their contributions. Thanks also to everyone who has already completed and returned the much larger questionnaire which was distributed in March 1992. In order to evaluate the impact of CTICML activity we need as many replies as possible from individuals (not just one per department), which is why a further copy of the questionnaire is included with this issue of *ReCALL*. If you have not already done so, please take the time to tick some boxes, even if you don't have the time to write comments. The final deadline is now 15 July.

With the next issue of ReCALL, I hope to include full details of additional publications from CTICML to appear later this year. These include an updated issue of the ReCALL Software Guide, a Bibliography of Intelligent CALL by Clive Matthews of the University of East Anglia, and the proceedings of the ICALL Conference held at UMIST in September 1991.
