### Introduction

The present report covers the period of three years from 1 January 1970 to 31 December 1972. It follows closely the pattern as set by previous reports, especially that for the years 1967–1969, formally approved by the XIVth General Assembly, and published in volume XIVB of the *Transactions of the IAU*.

The period under report includes the first eight months of the year 1970 (until 27 August) which fell under the responsibility of the former Executive Committee, but it does not include the first eight months of the year 1973, still within the responsibility of the present Executive Committee. An oral report for the period from 1 January to 20 August 1973 will be presented at the XVth General Assembly.

Decisions of the Executive Committee related to the XIVth General Assembly and printed in *Transactions* volume XIVB or published in the *Information Bulletin* of the IAU will not be repeated here. Thus, the present report is actually restricted to formal matters and deals with facts necessary for permanent record. The reports on the activity of IAU Commissions, Inter-Union Commissions, Astronomical Services, etc., have been included in the Reports on Astronomy, 1973, to be published as volume XVA of the *Transactions*.

The part called Activities Report deals with the administration of the Union, meetings of the Executive Committee, IAU Membership, adherence of countries, Commission of the IAU, colloquia and symposia organized by the Union, IAU publications, and relations to other organizations.

The part called Report on IAU Finances gives a rounded off picture of the receipts and payments of the Union during the period under report, and presents an outline of the Union's financial problems in the years to come. The report is supplemented by an appendix listing data on Adhering Organizations, IAU Members and IAU publications.

### Activities Report

Since 1970, the International Astronomical Union has operated in accord with the provisions of the new Statutes and By-laws adopted by the XIVth General Assembly, and of the Working Rules, as approved at the 34th meeting of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee and the Officers responsible for the administration of the Union have had to cope with two conflicting trends: the expanding activity of the IAU, on the one hand, and permanent inflation, on the other.

The number of IAU Members increased, as did that of IAU Commissions and Adhering Organizations; relations with other international and national organizations became more involved; the number of scientific meetings sponsored by the Union doubled in comparison with the period 1967– 1969; the number of IAU publications increased; two General Assemblies had to be prepared for 1973; a new type of scientific meetings held under the auspices of the IAU has been introduced, etc.

This difficult situation was met by adding a shorthand-typist to the existing staff of two over the periods of intensified work, and seeking external help when necessary. Moreover, the President, the General Secretary and the Assistant General Secretary benefited from the services of several secretaries and secretarial facilities in Copenhagen, Utrecht and Thessaloniki, generously provided by their respective home institutions. The Executive Committee realises that the staff of the Administrative Office is largely insufficient that, however, the finances of the Union, as they are, do not permit an improvement in this respect.

The expanded activity of the IAU had to be financed from budgeted funds whose value had dropped through inflation by more than 30% in the course of time. This prompted the Executive Committee to abandon the Union's policy of generosity, such as the free distribution of IAU Transactions to Members, and to propose to the General Assembly an increase of the unit of contribution payable by Adhering Organizations.

### Executive Committee

The Executive Committee, in its former composition, held its 33rd meeting in Brighton during the XIVth General Assembly, having had sessions on 16, 17 and 25 August 1970. The meeting was presided over by the President of the Union Prof. Dr O. Heckmann. All members and both advisors were present.

The 34th meeting of the Executive Committee, in its present composition, was held in Brighton on 27 August 1970, under the presidency of Prof. B. Strömgren. Excused were the Vice-Presidents Sir Bernard Lovell and Prof. E. R. Mustel. The President invited Dr C. A. Ronan and Prof. A. B. Severny to attend the meeting in their stead. Further, the Executive Committee held the following meetings:

The 35th meeting on Ile d'Yeu, France, from 6 to 10 September 1971. Prof. Dr O. Heckmann, advisor, was excused.

The 36th meeting in Copenhagen, Denmark, from 28 August to 1 September 1972. Prof. B. J. Bok, Vice-President, was excused.

The Executive Committee adopted, at its 35th meeting, the following resolution: "The IAU recognizes the fact that in certain parts of the world the need may be felt to start new regional activities involving especially young professional astronomers. The IAU will be happy to assist in, and to stimulate, the early organization of such activities whenever there seems to be an occasion on which the IAU's assistance may be needed."

This resolution led to the organization of the First European Astronomical Meeting under the Auspices of the IAU in Athens, Greece, from 4 to 9 September 1972.

### Officers' Meetings

The President of the IAU, the General Secretary accompanied by his staff, and the Assistant

General Secretary (Officers), met as follows: in Copenhagen, Denmark, on 27 October 1970, in Utrecht, The Netherlands, on 24 and 25 February 1971, in Thessaloniki, Greece, on 12 and 13 May 1971, in Copenhagen on 29 November 1971, in Utrecht on 30 and 31 January 1972, in Copenhagen on 9 May 1972, in Thessaloniki on 30 October 1972, in Paris, France, on 28 February 1973, and in Copenhagen on 8 June 1973.

The meetings were held to co-ordinate the Union's activities in its manifold fields of interest, to implement the decisions of the Executive Committee, and to outline future programmes.

### Adhering Countries

Cuba and Uruguay have adhered to the Union since 1970 thus bringing the number of Adhering Countries to 46. The Republic of Korea has asked for information regarding admission to the Union.

The list of Adhering Countries and corresponding adhering bodies, together with the approximate number of Members in each country, is given in the appendix on pages 25–26.

### Members of the IAU

The number of IAU Members was 1993 on 8 February 1970. A further 567 new Members were admitted at the XIVth General Assembly. On the other hand, the General Secretary had been informed of the decease of 46 Members and of the retirement of 5 Members, so that the Union had 2509 Members on 1 February 1973.

The list of Members whose decease has been notified since 28 February 1970 is given in the appendix on pages 26-27.

### Commissions of the IAU

The Transactions of the IAU, volume XVA, subtitled Reports on Astronomy 1973, include the reports prepared by each of the 39 Presidents of Commissions of the Union, assisted by their Vice-Presidents, Organizing Committees, those responsible for the various Working Groups within the Commissions, and by the Commission members, themselves.

The XIVth General Assembly created Commissions No. 47 on Cosmology and No. 48 on High Energy Astrophysics, and approved the merger of Commissions Nos. 23 "Carte du Ciel" and 24 on Stellar Parallaxes and Proper Motions into a single Commission No. 24 on Photographic Astrometry, thus bringing the number of Commissions to 39.

In view of the unfortunate decease of Professor M. G. J. Minnaert, Dr. A Dollfus was appointed President ad interim of Commission No. 17 on the Moon, and Dr M. W. Feast became President ad interim of Commission No. 27 on Variable Stars after the resignation of Dr O. J. Eggen.

Between the General Assemblies, Commissions have co-opted a number of new members from among the Members of the Union. These co-options have been approved by the Executive Committee and published in the *Information Bulletin*.

The Presidents of Commissions will prepare proposals for the new composition of Commissions including co-opted members and new IAU Members to be admitted at the General Assembly.

# IAU Publications

Budgetary considerations led the Executive Committee to suspend the free distribution of IAU publications to Members. Thus only institutions of developing countries continue obtaining IAU Symposium volumes free of charge. Members of the Organizing Committees of Symposia receive each a complimentary copy of the corresponding Symposium volume. All IAU publications are being produced and distributed for the account and risk of the publisher, who pays the IAU a royalty.

The IAU continues financing the production and distribution of the IAU Information Bulletin.

### Transactions of the IAU

The Transactions of the XIVth General Assembly were published in volumes A and B. Volume A, subtitled Reports on Astronomy, 1970, was distributed free of charge to IAU Members, Volume B, subtitled Proceedings of the Fourteenth General Assembly, Brighton 1970, was distributed free of charge to those who were Members of the IAU at the time of the XIVth General Assembly.

The Invited Discourses, proceedings of Joint Discussions and results of Special Meetings held during the XIVth General Assembly were published in the form of a symposium volume under the title *Highlights of Astronomy* (volume 2), as presented at the XIVth General Assembly of the IAU 1970.

Transactions volume A and B were financed from the budget of the IAU. The Highlights of Astronomy and all Symposium volumes went to the charge of the publisher.

IAU Information Bulletin

The *IAU Information Bulletin* was being prepared and edited by the General Secretary, and printed, published and distributed by D. Reidel Publishing Company, Dordrecht, Holland. It appeared twice a year and went, free of charge, to IAU Members, Consultants, members of International Science Writers Association, selected international organizations, and institutions on a special distribution list.

#### IAU Publication Policy

The deteriorating financial situation of the Union led the Executive Committee to measures of austerity which also reflect in the publication policy of the IAU. The free distribution of *Transactions* volumes XIVA and XIVB was a generosity which cost the IAU about \$28.000 U.S. If the Union continued in this generosity it would have either to have recourse to its reserves, small as they are, or significantly curtail its scientific programme and thus fail to live up to its responsibilities. It was therefore resolved to discontinue the free distribution of Transaction volumes to Members.

A major and permanent concern of the Executive Committee is the rising prices of IAU publications. Efforts were and are being made to ameliorate the situation, but unfortunately no practicable solution could be found. Four outstanding publishing houses had been asked for conditions for a new publishing contract. Two of them declined outright, one offer was rather hypothetical, and the terms of the only positive response were not found more advantageous than those of the present arrangement. The Executive Committee therefore abided by the arrangements with the D. Reidel Publishing Company, but instructed the General Secretary closely to observe the book market for possibilities of reducing the prices of IAU publications.

Perek, the Union at the XIIth meeting of the Executive Committee and 13th General Assembly of ICSU (Madrid, Spain, 24–29 September 1970). The General Secretary also represented the Union at the XIIIth meeting of the Executive Committeeof ICSU held in Ottawa, Canada, on 29 and 30 September 1971, and at the extraordinary General Assembly and related meetings (14th General Assembly, 1st Executive Board meeting) of ICSU in Helsinki, Finland, from 16 to 20 September 1972, where he was elected into the Executive Board as representative of International Unions.

# Direct Relations with UNESCO

The IAU had the benefit of a direct contract with UNESCO, which provided for grants toward the Astronomy Courses held in Nairobi, Kenya, in August 1972. These courses proved a great success, and the Executive Committee wishes to express to UNESCO its thanks for the financial help.

### Relations with ICSU

Over the period under report, the Union enjoyed the support of ICSU in all its efforts. In addition to the annual UNESCO subventions, transmitted to the Union by ICSU, this organism paid the Union, jointly with UNESCO, a further \$13.000 U.S. The Executive Committee feels that it has to extend its special thanks to ICSU for the generous assistance given to the Union.

### Report on IAU Finances

In accord with the policy adopted in 1961, the Executive Committee presents to the Members of the IAU a "Summarized Account of Receipts and Payments" for the period from 1 January 1970 to 31 December 1972. All accounts are in U.S. dollars converted from other currencies at the following ICSU conversion rates, treated as exact:

The unstable situation on the money market, as reflected in the varying coversion rates, accounts for the disparities between the closing balances in 1969, 1970 and 1971, and the opening balances in 1970, 1971 and 1972 respectively:

The decreasing value of the U.S. dollar, and its eventual devaluation, depreciated the IAU assets on U.S. bank accounts by about 20 per cent.

Certain bank operations, such as transfers from one IAU account to the other, and reimbursements, were made at current rates of exchange and thus resulted in exchange differences.

The summarized account has been derived from 13 (7 in 1970, 3 each in 1971 and 1972) individual accounts of receipts and payments audited and certified as correct by the Union's professional accountants. These accounts will be available for examination by the Finance Committee at the XVth General Assembly.

# Summarized Account of Receipts and Payments

The statement on pages  $\frac{41-14}{1}$  is a simple account of receipts and payments collected for convenience under a few main headings. The following explanatory notes provide more detailed information on each item of the accounts.

### Receipts

1. Contributions from Adhering Countries. The XIVth General Assembly of the IAU, held in Brighton, resolved that the unit of contribution remain fixed at 900 gold francs until 1973. This unit of contribution equalled \$293,94 U.S. at the time of the General Assembly. The parity of 900 gold francs=\$293,94 became untenable with the deteriorating position of the U.S. dollar, so that the 1972 contributions had to be collected in gold francs. Unfortunately, not all Adhering Countries established the conversion rate of the gold franc into the currencies used for payment correctly, which led to irregularities in the case of 13 countries.

As on 31 December 1972, the IAU had 46 Adhering Countries paying annually a total of 221 units of contributions. Seventeen countries adhered in category 1, twelve in category 2, seven in category 3, two in category 4, three in category 5, four in category 7, and one in category 8.

The contributions of 32 Adhering Countries had passed through the bank before 31 December 1972, and one payment made in 1972 passed the accounts after 31 December 1972. Five Adhering Countries owe their dues to the Union since 1971, seven Adhering Countries failed to pay their contributions for 1972, and one country only paid 13/14 of its membership fee for that year.

2. Sales of publications. The receipts of \$15.892,44 U.S. are by about \$1.700 U.S. higher than anticipated in the budgets for 1970, 1971 and 1972. They consist of payments made by Academic Press Inc. (London) for sales of publications, royalties from the same publishers, royalties from Cambridge University Press, royalties from D. Reidel Publishing Company, and revenues from sales made by the Secretariat.

3. Interest on accounts. The interest of \$1.190,50 U.S. earned on the savings account at the Amsterdam-Rotterdam Bank in 1970 has been transferred to the current account at that bank. For the years 1971 and 1972 it has been allowed to accumulate on the savings account. The same applies to the interest earned on the savings accounts at the Chemical Bank and the American Savings Bank for 1970 through 1972. \$140,66, 140,78 and 81,67 were earned on the current account at the Amsterdam-Rotterdam Bank over 1970, 1971 and 1972 respectively. The total interest earned on the savings accounts at Amsterdam-Rotterdam Bank, Chemical Bank and American Savings Bank over 1970-1972 is \$9.690,68 U.S.

4. UNESCO subvention through ICSU. Detailed accounts of the expenditure of this subvention are submitted to UNESCO (through ICSU) each year. The distribution of the subvention is left to the discretion of the IAU within the permitted UNESCO categories.

In 1970 and 1971 the normal UNESCO subvention of \$14.000 U.S. was increased by \$3.000 U.S. for each year, in 1972 by \$1.000 U.S. The loss of \$103,84 U.S. is accounted for by the difference between the ICSU conversion rate of the Dutch guilder and the actual bank rate, and by bank charges.

5. UNESCO contracts. The \$2.000 U.S. in 1970 are the final payment by UNESCO towards the Young Astronomers' School held in Hyderabad, India, in 1969 (Contract UNESCO/SC/1492/69). The \$2.000 U.S. in 1972 represent the final payment by UNESCO towards the Young Astronomers' School held in Cordoba, Argentina, in 1970 (Contract UNESCO/SC/1973/70), and the \$2.000 U.S. in 1972 are a UNESCO grant for the Nairobi Astronomical Courses, 1972 (Contract UNESCO/SC/ HP 250.727).

6. Other receipts. The entries under this heading largely misrepresent the actual receipts of the Union, as they include internal bank transfers, transient items, reimbursements, etc. The following is an analysis of the amounts of \$43.457,71, \$6.496,79 and \$2.480,16 U.S. for the years 1970, 1971 and 1972 respectively:

It is seen that the bulk of this sum is made up of transfers from one current account to another, of various reimbursements and erroneous credits which are balanced by corresponding payments and cannot therefore be considered as effective receipts.

### **Payments**

The headings have been numbered to correspond to those of the budget approved by the XIVth General Assembly.

1. Administrative Office. The expenses of the Administrative Office include the salaries, social

Total

security and pension payments of the staff of the IAU Secretariat and expenditure for a typewriter, stationery, etc. It should be noted that thanks to the generosity of the Czechoslovak Academy of Sciences, the Astronomical Institute in Utrecht, the Observatoriet in Cophenagen, and the University of Thessaloniki, the Union paid no rental, had the free use of all communication facilities, and only spent a negligible amount on stationery.

2. Contributions to ICSU. The annual contributions of the Union towards the administrative expenses of ICSU have been raised, from 1971 on, from 2 to 2,5 per cent of the income from membership fees for the year preceding payment.

3. Specific Projects of Commissions. Details of the allocations approved by the XIVth General Assembly are given in the report of the Finance Committee (*Transactions IAU*, vol. XIIIB for 1970; *Transactions IAU*, vol. XIVB for 1971–1973). Actual payments were as in the list on page 14 which requires only little comment.

The grant towards the publication of the Card Catalogue of Clusters and Associations is a balance from 1970 which is not covered by the allocations made in that year.

Commission No. 20 waived the grants attributed for 1972 and 1973 which represents a saving of \$1.000 U.S. under this heading.

The balance as on 31 December 1972 consists of credits in favour of the different projects which may, but need not be spent in 1973.

4. General Assembly expenses. The amount of \$21.786,04, as given in the summary account for 1970, had been withdrawn from the IAU current bank accounts in connection with the XIVth General Assembly in Brighton, 1970. This sum was used as follows:

The costs of the XIVth General Assembly itself were \$19.212,17 U.S., that is by about \$1.400 U.S. more than in 1967.

The amounts of \$52.00 U.S. in 1971 and \$916, 44 in 1972 were paid in preparation for the General Assemblies in 1973.

5. *IAU Publications*. The IAU only financed the production of *Transactions* volumes XIVA and XIVB, and of the *Information Bulletin*. All other IAU publications were financed by the publisher. A considerable amount was spent on the purchase of IAU symposium volumes distributed free of charge to institutions of developing countries. The expenditure under this heading was as follows:

6. Meetings of the Executive Committee. The costs of the 33rd and 34th meetings of the Executive Committee held in Brighton, 1970, are included under heading 4, General Assembly expenses.

The amount of \$10.839,74, as costs of the 35th meeting of the Executive Committee, calls for explanation. A cheque of \$4.200 sent to France for financing the meeting could not be collected owing to French monetary restrictions. Money in cash had to be taken to France from the current account at the Amsterdam-Rotterdam Bank. The refund of \$4.200 U.S. for the unused cheque was credited to the Union with \$4.229,08 U.S. as per new rate of exchange. Moreover, \$684,81 were refunded to the account of the IAU as unused part of the money taken out in cash. Thus

The amount of \$6.204,21 as costs of the 36th meeting of the Executive Committee gives the following net expenses if analysed:

The figures of \$5.925,85 U.S. for 1971 and \$5.824,71 U.S. for 1972 compare well with the figures of \$6.124,61 U.S. and \$5.647,14 U.S. for 1968 and 1969 respectively.

7. Meetings of Officers. The ever more complicated administration of the Union requires that the President, General Secretary and Assistant General Secretary meet at more or less regular intervals to co-ordinate action. The bulk of the expenditure under this heading is for travel expenses of the

officers and staff, so that the total expenditure for the meetings increases with increasing distance between the participants. This should be borne in mind when preparing the budgets for the coming years.

8. Symposia and Colloquia. The payments were, as a rule, for travel grants towards participation in the meetings; organizational expenses incurred by the IAU were insignificant. The grants were allocated by the Organizing Committees of the meetings and had to be approved by the Assistant General Secretary. The payments were made by the Secretariat. The following table shows the payments in more detail:

10. Projects authorized by the Executive Committee. The \$200 U.S. paid in 1971 were a grant towards the publication of the Bibliography and Program Notes of Eclipsing Binaries (Commission No. 42) and \$1.578,45 U.S. were expenses incurred, in 1972, with the preparation of the First European Astronomical Meeting held, under the auspices of the IAU, in Athens, September 1972 (initiated by the Executive Committee).

# CONCLUSION

The assets of \$137.793,66 U.S., as on 31 December 1972, compare well with those of \$113.261,57 U.S., as on 31 December 1969 (\$112.916,59, as on 1 January 1970, due to the change of the conversion rate of the French franc): the balance in hand is \$24.877,07 U.S.

The budget approved by the XIVth General Assembly for the years 1971–1973 provided for an expenditure of \$225.000 U.S. balanced by an income of \$225.000 U.S. This budget, compared with the actual receipts and payments of the years 1971 and 1972, gives the balance for the year 1973 as follows:

# Receipts

- 1. The figure of \$91.200 U.S. also includes \$15.351,25 U.S. outstanding for 1972. All contributions not paid before the devaluation of the U.S. dollar have been augmented by 10 per cent.
- 2. D. Reidel Publishing Company owes the Union about \$7.150 U.S. on royalties for the second half of 1971. From figures available on sales over 1972 it is safe to assume that \$4.450 U.S. will be payable in 1973.
- 3. The sum of \$3.000 U.S. represents interest earned in 1972. In 1973 they may be somewhat higher if the rate of interest does not drop.
- 4. UNESCO subvention through ICSU: The grant of \$14,000 U.S. has already been allocated for 1973.

### **Payments**

- 1. Administrative Office: \$27.000 U.S. are the difference between the amounts budgeted for 1970-1973 and those actually paid. Raised by 10% they give \$29,700 U.S.
- 2. Contribution to ICSU: has been set at 2.5% of the annual fees received from Adhering Countries. It had been paid before the devaluation of the U.S. dollar.
- 3. Commission expenses: are expected to be negligible
- 4. Specific Projects: see table on page 14. The balance for 1973 has been adjusted to account for the devaluation.
- 5. General Assembly: The estimate of \$49.500 U.S. (adjusted) is rather vulnerable as it depends on a range of variable factors. The reserve of \$10.000 U.S. at the disposal of the General Secretary should be considered as a reserve against underestimates (reserve approved by the XIVth General Assembly).
- 6. IAU Publications: The amount of \$7.700 U.S. covers the production and distribution of 4 Information Bulletins (\$1.650 U.S. each) and the printing of the Report of the Executive Committee.
- 7. Free copies to developing countries: Seven volumes of Symposium proceedings will have to be distributed free of charge in 1973 (about \$990 U.S. each).
- 8. Executive Committee: The costs of the 37th and 38th meetings of the Executive Committee are included in those of the XVth General Assembly (heading 5).
- 9. Officers' meetings: The officers are likely to be farther apart after the General Assembly. This accounts for the increase of about \$770 U.S. over the expenditure in 1972.
- Symposia and Colloquia: 11 symposia (\$1.775 U.S. each on the average) and 1 colloquium (\$500 U.S.) will be held in 1973. \$1.000 U.S. have been comitted as an IAU contribution to the Copernicus Symposium cosponsored by the Union.
- 11. Inter-Union Commissions: The contribution to CIES had to be increased by \$200 for 1973. This accounts for the \$4.500 U.S. instead of the \$4.300 U.S. as in 1972.
- 12, 13, 14 Expenditure under these headings is expected to be negligible.
- 15. Young Astronomers' Schools: Nine Member Countries increased their categories of adherence in response to the General Secretary's appeal. The organization of a School for Young Astronomers in 1973 is therefore within the intentions of the XIVth General Assembly.
  - The Finance Committee, to convene during the XVth General Assembly, will be asked to endorse the budgetary estimate for 1973, as proposed above, and to approve a comprehensive budget for the years 1974–1976 to be submitted to the General Assembly.
