17. GOTAMA IN THE AVESTA.

Bombay. March 11, 1898.

To Professor T. W. RHYS DAVIDS, Ph.D., LL.D., Secretary and Librarian, Royal Asiatic Society.

DEAR SIR,—In my study of the important arguments which have been put forth by the late M. J. Darmesteter to prove his theory of the date of the Avesta, I am able to discover an important identification of the Avestic Gaotema with the Vedic Gotama. In the Rig-veda, Nodhas is Gotama's son, who is called Nâidhyanghô Gaotemahe in the Avesta. Hence it is probable that the controversies referred to in the Farvardin Yasht was carried on by Zoroastrians against the Vedic poet Nodhâs, and not against Gaotama Buddha. The point most important in the arguments of M. J. Darmesteter is that a "passage in the Yashts mentions controversies victoriously carried on by Zoroastrians against the impostor Gaotema." The Avesta passage alluded to by the French savant is contained in the Farvardin Yasht, section 16, in which the mention of the name Gaotema has
