PUBLICATIONS

Automatic Subject Citation Alert

The Institute for Scientific Information now offers the first large-scale computerized literature-alerting service to researchers working in the social sciences. Called Automatic Subject Citation Alert, the service is designed to search through 3,500 of the world's most important journals and alert subscribers to newly published articles that are relevant to their particular interests. The service provides the subscribers with weekly bibliographies that give a complete description of each article located including title, author, and journal citation.

There are two ways to use the service. One is for subscribers to select topics they want to keep up with from a list supplied by the Institute. This form of the service is called ASCATOPICS and costs \$95 per year. Another form of the service is available for those whose interests are so specialized that they are not likely to be found on the standard list of topics. In these cases, an ISI information specialist will help develop a custom search profile, called ASCA, and costs a minimum of \$115 per year (prices vary according to the complexity of the search profile).

If copies of articles located through ASCA or ASCATOPICS cannot be obtained through a library, subscribers can write for a reprint using the authors' mailing addresses provided with the articles listed on their weekly reports, or they can purchase copies of the articles through ISI's Original Article Tear Sheet (OATS) service. CoDoC

The Cooperation in Documentation and Communication International Secretariat is a cooperating body of public documentation and communication centers engaged in the exchange of information available on the problems that the Third World confronts. CoDoC has just published the first in an experimental series of four projected catalogues to be produced during 1974.
