# **Computer Comments**

# HOW TO TRANSFER FILES OVER THE INTERNET USING FTP

There are many methods one can use to transfer files over the Internet. Perhaps the most obvious way is to include the file as part of an electronic mail (e-mail) message. However, the restrictions imposed by mail software on the sending and receiving ends may prevent a file from transferring correctly. For example, mail software might limit the total size of a mail message, it might limit the length of each record, or it might not allow binary data to be sent. Clearly, a method more suitable for these special files is needed.

FTP (File Transfer Protocol), which is part of the TCP/IP networking software upon which the Internet is based, provides file transfer support capabilities beyond those of e-mail. FTP allows a user to connect and login to a remote computer to transfer files to and/or from the user's local computer. To use FTP you need to have a valid username/ password on the remote computer. Fortunately, computers on the Internet that offer free bulletin board access also nor-

mally use *anonymous* as the username and, as a courtesy to the bulletin board administrator, your e-mail address as the password. This combination of anonymous/e-mail-address for username and password is commonly referred to as *anonymous FTP*. (It is surprisingly difficult to spell anonymous correctly.) The IP address used to tell FTP which computer to connect to looks like the part to the right of the @ in a normal e-mail address. The machine offering the anonymous FTP service is commonly called an *FTP server* or *FTP bulletin board*. Once connected to an FTP server, a series of commands is available to allow one to navigate directories and to transfer files.

Figure 1, below, shows an example FTP session. While the examples used in this article were produced on a VAX/VMS system, the commands used should be very similar in most implementations of FTP. In the example the password is not echoed when it is typed as part of the *login* command but has been shown here for clarity. The machine connected to is *icdd.com*, the ICDD FTP server.
