

This world-wide compilation of housing and related statistics is prepared by the Statistical Office of the United Nations with the assistance of the Population Division and in co-operation with the Centre for Housing, Building and Planning. Its main purpose is to make available information derived from national-housing censuses and to provide for a more complete interpretation of this information than would otherwise be possible by presenting other data that have a bearing on the housing situation. These include data on population and its growth, dwelling construction, the cost of housing, and capital formation in housing.

MANUSCRIPT SUBMISSION

International Organization, the principal scholarly periodical in its field, publishes analytical articles, review essays of current literature in the field, brief notes dealing with problems of both theoretical and methodological interest, and comments designed to encourage lively interchanges of views on issues of wide interest, public policy, and previously published articles, review essays, notes, and comments.

Manuscripts submitted for publication should focus primarily on the development, functioning, or political factors associated with international agencies and regional arrangements, or on their dynamic relationships with the international political and economic environments in which they operate.

The Board of Editors welcomes fresh critical analyses along the foregoing lines. It is not interested in descriptions or chronological treatments of institutions with little assessment and interpretation. Manuscripts should provide original, insightful interpretations and evaluations of significant developments or trends; they should not repeat material familiar and elsewhere available to specialists in international affairs.

All manuscripts should be sent in triplicate to the Editor, Robert O. Keohane, at the address below. Articles and review essays submitted for consideration should not exceed 35 double-spaced typewritten pages (8½" × 11"). Notes on theory and method and comments should not exceed 2,000 words. All footnotes must be placed together at the end of each manuscript—not at the bottom of each page. The style should be consistent with the University of Chicago's A Manual of Style.

Decisions on publication are made pursuant to independent critical comment by two or more competent readers including the Editor. Authors may expect a decision within six weeks of the Editor's receipt of a manuscript.
