American Friends of the Middle East

American Friends of the Middle East has since 1951 provided services in educational counseling and placement of students from the Middle East and North Africa. During the past four years more than 40,000 students from thirteen countries were interviewed overseas by AFMA representatives. Staffed by experienced counselors fluent in both English and the local language, AFME's offices feature complete libraries of American university and college catalogs, reference works, comparative education studies and current information on graduate fields of study, financial aid, testing and U.S. living costs. Complementing and supervising the overseas staffs is the Educational Services Department in Washington which reviews and directs the processing of all applications accepted for AFME student programs, and administers U.S. study programs for a growing list of governments, institutions and companies.

Administration and supervision of U.S. study programs sponsored by governments, institutions and companies are handled by AFME under direct cost contracts. Students or trainees in these programs are admitted to the U.S. under AFME's Exchange-Visitor Program. They are provided with language training as necessary, placement, orientation, full administrative support and supervision. Sponsors receive periodic detailed reports regarding the progress of each student/trainee.

Information and counseling services of AFME are available to both sponsored and unsponsored students.

Placement services of AFME are available only to students having qualifications which are considered comparable to U.S. admissions standards. Emphasis is given to the placement of graduate students undertaking study programs related to the national development needs of their countries.

Scholarship placement for outstanding applicants who have demonstrated need is an annual program in which AFME presents candidates from the area to American universities offering financial aid to foreign students.

Orientation prior to departure for the U.S. is offered all AFME-related students either in group sessions or individual counseling conferences.

Interview services are available to U.S. institutions for students applying directly from the Middle East and North Africa. AFME will also interpret academic grades on the basis of the local AFME counselor's knowledge of the grading employed by the institution and by the national education system, and will answer specific questions posed by the requesting institutions.

Institutional information on the history, structure, grading system, academic level or other relevant data about specific Middle Eastern institutions is provided on request.

Programming of Middle Eastern and North African visitors to the U.S. and of U.S. visitors to the area is provided. AFME is prepared to administer sponsored visits of area nationals individually or in groups in most general fields and especially in the field of educaton. Asian Reference Publications

The domestic politics and foreign relations of China and India are treated extensively in two new reference publications on Asia. The first, *Doctoral Dissertations on China: A Bibliography of Studies in Western Languages, 1945-1970* by Leonard H. D. Gordon and Frank J. Shulman, appears in the new Association for Asian Studies "Reference Series." This is a comprehensive, interdisciplinary listing of 2217 theses dealing in whole or in part with Mongolia, Tibet, and the overseas Chinese communities as well as with China herself. The second, Frank J. Shulman's Doctoral Dissertations on South Asia, 1966-1970: An Annotated Bibliography Covering North America, Europe, and Australia, is the latest publication in the recently inaugurated series "Michigan Papers on South and Southeast Asia." A compilation of 1305 theses, it represents the latest and most advanced doctoral research on the former civilizations and the contemporary affairs of Ceylon, India, Nepal and Pakistan. Both bibliographies provide not only information on the availability of the dissertations cited and on the location of their published abstracts but also ready access to the classified entries through the author, institutional and subject indexes. Speakers may be asked to speak before professional groups, conduct or take part in a panel or group discussion, give an academic lecture, participate in a seminar, or attend an event offering opportunity for informal contacts and exchanges of ideas.

These speakers must be traveling abroad either privately or under sponsorship other than a U.S. Government grant and should be willing to remain more than a day or two in place where they can be programmed.

The U.S. Information Agency's Washington office compiles and transmits to its overseas offices data on the background and availability of scholars and specialists willing to serve as speakers. It neither awards grants nor makes programming commitments.

Overseas offices of the Agency needing the services of a specialist to participate in a program will contact him directly or, in some cases specialists will be programmed directly from Washington. Compensations agreed upon between the specialist and the USIA overseas offices will normally cover per diem or a small fee for such participation as well as any travel expenses incurred for detours from the planned itinerary.
