INSTRUCTIONS FOR CONTRIBUTORS

AJS Review publishes scholarly articles and book reviews covering the field of Jewish Studies. From biblical and rabbinic textual and historical studies to modern history, social sciences, the arts, and literature, the journal welcomes articles of interest to both academic and lay audiences around the world. A substantial portion of each volume is devoted to reviews of the latest Judaic scholarship and review essays on current trends in the field.

MANUSCRIPT SUBMISSION

Manuscripts for consideration should be e-mailed as a MS Word or rich text file to the *AJS Review* managing editor at ajsreview@ajs.cjh.org. Articles will be put through a process of blind refereeing. Authors should avoid any identifying references in their submissions and provide a **separate title page** with their name, contact information, and institutional affiliation along with a **short abstract** (ca. 200 words). Manuscripts should conform to *Chicago Manual of Style*, ed. 15. Authors of accepted articles will be asked to prepare a final version in the journal's style, which is available online at: www.ajsnet.org/ajsreview.htm

COPYRIGHT


