Organizing China

The Problem of Bureaucracy, 1949-1976

Harry Harding. Since establishment of the People's Republic in 1949, Chinese Communist leaders have constructed an administrative apparatus that has exercised broader and tighter control over Chinese society than any government in the country's history. This is a history of the development of Chinese organizational policy—a topic of constant concern and often strident debate—from 1949 to the death of Mao Tse-tung in 1976. The author argues that Chinese organizational policy has been controversial because of the complexity of administrative problems, the effects of policy changes on the distribution of power and status, and the philosophical dilemma of whether the efficiency of modern bureaucracy outweighs its social and political costs. \$29.50
