ON FRÉCHET ALGEBRAS OF POWER SERIES

If the indeterminate X in a Fréchet algebra A of power series is a power series generator for A, then either A is the algebra of all formal power series or is the Beurling-Fréchet algebra on non-negative integers defined by a sequence of weights. Let the topology of A be defined by a sequence of norms. Then A is an inverse limit of a sequence of Banach algebras of power series if and only if each norm in the defining sequence satisfies certain closability condition and an equicontinuity condition due to Loy. A non-Banach uniform Fréchet algebra with a power series generator is a nuclear space. A number of examples are discussed; and a functional analytic description of the holomorphic function algebra on a simply connected planar domain is obtained.

1. INTRODUCTION AND EXAMPLES

A Fréchet algebra is a linear associative algebra A with identity and having a Hausdorff topology defined by a sequence $(p_k)_{k\geq 1}$ (assumed increasing without loss of generality) of submultiplicative seminorms on it such that A is complete in this topology. Such an A is an inverse limit of a sequence of Banach algebras ([5]). A Fréchet algebra A is called a *uniform Fréchet algebra* if for each $k \geq 1$ and for each $x \in A$, $p_k(x^2) = p_k(x)^2$. An element x in a Fréchet algebra A is a *power series* generator for A if each $y \in A$ is of the form $y = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n$, λ_n complex scalars, such that $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| p_k(x^n) < \infty$ for all k. Let \mathcal{F} be the Fréchet algebra of all formal power series $f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n X^n$ having complex coefficients λ_n and in an indeterminate X with the weak topology defined by the projections $\pi_m : \mathcal{F} \to \mathbb{C}, m \in \mathbb{Z}^+$, where $\pi_m(f) = \lambda_m$. A defining sequence of seminorms for \mathcal{F} is (p_k) ,

$$p_k\left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\lambda_n X^n\right) = \sum_{n=0}^k |\lambda_n|.$$

A Fréchet algebra of power series is a subalgebra A of \mathcal{F} which is a Fréchet algebra containing X such that the inclusion $A \hookrightarrow \mathcal{F}$ is continuous ([7, 8]). A weight function on \mathbb{Z}^+ is a function $\omega : \mathbb{Z}^+ \to \mathbb{R}$ such that for all $m, n \in \mathbb{Z}^+, \omega(m+n) \leq \omega(m)\omega(n)$ and $\omega(n) > 0$. The present paper is concerned with the following two questions on Fréchet algebras of power series A.

- (1) When is X a power series generator for A?
- (2) When is A isomorphic to an inverse limit of Banach algebras of power series?

We show that X is a power series generator for A if and only if A is either \mathcal{F} or is the Beurling-Fréchet algebra

$$\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, oldsymbol{\omega}) := igcap_{k=1}^\infty \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega_k)$$

defined by a sequence $\omega = (\omega_k)$ of weight functions on \mathbb{Z}^+ . It is also shown that if the topology of A is defined by a sequence of norms (p_k) then A is an inverse limit of a sequence of Banach algebras of power series if and only if each p_k is closable satisfying the condition

(E): For each $m \in \mathbb{Z}^+$, there exists $c_{m,k} > 0$ such that

$$|\pi_m(f)| \leq c_{m,k} p_k(f)$$
 for all $f \in A$.

The existence of a (p_k) satisfying (E) is equivalent to Loy's condition (E) ([7, 8]); whereas closability of a norm on a normed algebra of power series is a necessary and sufficient condition for the completion to be a Banach algebra of power series. This implies the uniqueness of the Fréchet space topology and automatic continuity of derivations on the Beurling-Fréchet algebra $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$. We also show that a non-Banach uniform Fréchet algebra with a power series generator is necessarily nuclear as a locally convex space. The paper ends with functional analytical characterisations of certain holomorphic function algebras on planar domains.

Our definition of a Fréchet algebra with a power series generator is motivated by Allan's definition of a Banach algebra with a power series generator ([1]). Banach algebras of power series have already been established as an important aspect of contemporary Banach algebra theory. Though Fréchet algebras of power series have been considered earlier by Loy ([7, 8]); recently they — and more generally, the power series ideas in general Fréchet algebras — have acquired significance in understanding the structure of a Fréchet algebra ([2, 3]). We end this introduction by giving few examples of Fréchet algebras of power series with the objective of fixing notation. Fréchet Algebras

EXAMPLE 1.1. The indeterminate X is a power series generator for \mathcal{F} , since for any

$$f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n X^n, \ \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| p_k(X^n) = \sum_{n=0}^k |\lambda_n| = p_k(f).$$

EXAMPLE 1.2. The Beurling-Banach algebra

$$\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+,\omega) := \left\{ f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n X^n \in \mathcal{F} : |f|_{\omega} := \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n|\omega(n) < \infty \right\}$$

is a Banach algebra of power series with norm $|\cdot|_{\omega}$ and having a power series generator X. Given an increasing sequence $\omega = (\omega_k)_{k \ge 1}$ of weight functions, the algebra

$$\ell^1ig(\mathbb{Z}^+,oldsymbol{\omega}ig):=igcap_{k=1}^\infty\ell^1ig(\mathbb{Z}^+,\omega_kig)$$

is a Fréchet algebra with power series generator X, the topology being defined by $\{|\cdot|_{\omega_k} : k \in \mathbb{N}\}$.

EXAMPLE 1.3. Let

$$D = \{z \in \mathbb{C} : |Z| \leq 1\}, \qquad U = \{z \in \mathbb{C} : |Z| < 1\}.$$

Let A(D) be the disc algebra on D. Let $\omega = (\omega_k)_{k \ge 1}$ be as above, $\omega_k(n) \ge 1$ for all k, for all n. Let

$$A(D,\omega_k) := \left\{ f \in A(D) : f(z) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{f^{(n)}(0)}{n!} z^n, \ |f|_{\omega_k} := \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{\left|f^{(n)}(0)\right|}{n!} \omega_k(n) < \infty \right\}.$$

Then $(A(D, \omega_k), |\cdot|_{\omega_k})$ is a Banach subalgebra of A(D); and identifying f with $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (f^{(n)}(0)/n!) X^n$, it is a Banach algebra of power series having power series generator X. Thus $A(D, \omega) = \bigcap_{k=1}^{\infty} A(D, \omega_k)$ is a power series generated Fréchet algebra of power series. Similarly, one can consider the algebras $H^{\infty}(U, \omega)$, $H(U, \omega_k)$ and $H(U, \omega)$. Notice that both A(D) and $H^{\infty}(U)$ are uniform Banach algebras of power series which are not power series generated.

EXAMPLE 1.4. Let H(U) be the Fréchet algebra of all holomorphic functions on U with the compact-open topology defined by the norms

$$||f||_{\infty,r_k} := \sup\left\{ \left| f(z) \right| : |z| \leq r_k \right\}, \ (r_k)_{k \geq 1}$$

being an increasing sequence of positive numbers r_k , $0 < r_k < 1$ and $r_k \to 1$. The radius of convergence of the Taylor series $f(z) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (f^{(n)}(0)/n!) z^n$ of each $f \in H(U)$ is not less than 1; and

$$\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{\left|f^{(n)}(0)\right|}{n!} \|z^{n}\|_{\infty, r_{k}} \leqslant \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{\left|f^{(n)}(0)\right|}{n!} r_{k}^{n} < \infty$$

showing that H(U) is a power series generated uniform Fréchet algebra of power series. It contains the Fréchet algebra $H(U, \omega) := \bigcap_{k=1}^{\infty} H(U, \omega_k)$. The Fréchet algebra \mathbb{E} of entire functions with the compact-open topology defined by the norms $\{ \|\cdot\|_{\infty,k} : k \in \mathbb{N} \}$ is a power series generated Fréchet algebra of power series, whose topology is also defined by $\{ |\cdot|_k : k \in \mathbb{N} \}$,

$$|f|_k = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{|f^{(n)}(0)|}{n!} k^n.$$

EXAMPLE 1.5. Let $C^k(\Gamma)$ be the Banach algebra of all C^k -functions defined on the unit circle Γ . Let $A^k(\Gamma) = \{f \in C^k(\Gamma) : \text{ the Fourier coefficients } \widehat{f}(n) = 0 \text{ for all } n < 0\}$. Identifying f with its Fourier series, $A^k(\Gamma)$ is a Banach algebra of power series. Let

$$A^{k+}(\Gamma) = \left\{ f \in A^k(\Gamma) : |f|_{k+} := \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\widehat{f}(n)| n^k < \infty \right\},$$

a power series generated Banach algebra with the norm $|\cdot|_{k+}$. Let

$$||f||_{k} = \max_{0 \leq i \leq k} \left(\sup_{x \in \Gamma} |f^{(i)}(x)| \right) \text{ for } f \in C^{\infty}(\Gamma).$$

Then for any k, there exists c > 0 such that $A^{k+1}(\Gamma) \subset A^{k+1}(\Gamma) \subset A^k(\Gamma)$, and $\|f\|_k \leq \|f\|_{k+1} \leq c \|f\|_{k+1}$ for all $f \in A^{k+1}(\Gamma)$. Thus

$$A^{\infty}(\Gamma) = \bigcap_{k=0}^{\infty} A^{k}(\Gamma) = \bigcap_{k=0}^{\infty} A^{k+}(\Gamma)$$

is a Fréchet algebra of power series having power series generator $e^{i\theta}$. It is a closed subalgebra of the Fréchet algebra $C^{\infty}(\Gamma)$. Like \mathcal{F} , and unlike any non-Banach uniform Fréchet algebra considered in Example 1.4 above, $A^{\infty}(\Gamma)$ is a *Q*-algebra in the sense that its invertible elements form an open set. The Gelfand space of $A^{\infty}(\Gamma)$ is *D*.

2. Power series generated Fréchet algebras of power series

THEOREM 2.1. Let A be a Fréchet algebra of power series in an indeterminate X. Suppose that X is a power series generator for A. Then A is either \mathcal{F} or the Beurling-Fréchet algebra $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$ for an increasing sequence ω of weights on \mathbb{Z}^+ .

An element x in a Fréchet algebra A generates a cyclic basis [6, Chapter III, Section 7] if each $f \in A$ can be uniquely expressed as $f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n$, λ_n being scalars. A seminorm p on a Fréchet algebra A having a power series generator x is a power series generator seminorm if

$$p\left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\lambda_n x^n\right) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty}|\lambda_n|p(x^n)$$

for all $f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n \in A$.

LEMMA 2.2. Let A be a singly generated Fréchet algebra with a cyclic basis generated by x. Then there exists a dense Fréchet subalgebra A_1 of A such that

- (i) A_1 is continuously embedded in A_i ;
- (ii) A_1 is a Fréchet algebra having a power series generator x; and
- (iii) A_1 is a Banach algebra provided A is a Banach algebra.

PROOF: Let (p_k) be an increasing sequence of seminorms defining the topology τ of A. Since each $f \in A$ has a unique expression $f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n$, the extended real number

$$q_k(f) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| p_k(x^n) \ge p_k(f)$$

is well defined for each $k \in \mathbb{N}$. Let

$$A_1 = \left\{ f \in A : q_k(f) < \infty \text{ for all } k \in \mathbb{N} \right\}.$$

Given

$$f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n, \ g = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \mu_n x^n,$$

the absolute convergence of these series in A implies that

$$f+g=\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}(\lambda_n+\mu_n)x^n, \ fg=\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(\sum_{m=0}^n\lambda_m\mu_{n-m}\right)x^n;$$

and for each k,

$$\begin{aligned} q_{k}(f+g) &\leq \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_{n} + \mu_{n}| p_{k}(x^{n}) \leq q_{k}(f) + q_{k}(g) < \infty, \\ q_{k}(fg) &\leq \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \sum_{m=0}^{n} |\lambda_{m}| |\mu_{n-m}| p_{k}(x^{m+n-m}) \leq \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \sum_{m=0}^{n} |\lambda_{m}| |\mu_{n-m}| p_{k}(x^{m}) p_{k}(x^{n-m}) \\ &\leq q_{k}(f) q_{k}(g) < \infty. \end{aligned}$$

This shows that A_1 is a subalgebra of A and (q_k) is an increasing sequence of submultiplicative seminorms on A_1 defining a topology τ_1 finer than the relative topology τ . We show that (A_1, τ_1) is complete.

Let (y_m) , $y_m = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_{n,m} x^n$, be a τ_1 -Cauchy sequence in A_1 . Then it is τ -Cauchy, and $y_m \to y$ in (A, τ) . Since $\phi_m(n) = \lambda_{n,m} x^n$ is τ -Cauchy (in fact, uniformly τ -Cauchy over m), there are scalars λ_n such that $\phi_m(n) \to \lambda_n x^n$ in τ uniformly over m. Then for each i,

$$\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| p_i(x^n) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lim_m |\lambda_{n,m}| p_i(x^n) \leq \underline{\lim}_m \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_{n,m}| p_i(x^n) \leq \underline{\lim}_m q_i(y_m) < \infty$$

as (y_m) is τ_1 -Cauchy. Further $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n$ converges in (A, τ) ; since for each *i* and for each $m \ge n$,

$$p_i\left(\sum_{k=0}^m \lambda_k x^k - \sum_{k=0}^n \lambda_k x^k\right) = p_i\left(\sum_{k=n+1}^m \lambda_k x^k\right) \leqslant \sum_{k=n+1}^m |\lambda_k| p_i(x^k) \to 0 \text{ as } n, \ m \to \infty.$$

Then we have $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n = y$ and $y_m \to y$ in (A_1, τ_1) . Indeed for each i,

$$q_i\left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\lambda_n x^n - y_m\right) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n - \lambda_{n,m}| p_i(x^n) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lim_{k \to \infty} |\lambda_{n,k} - \lambda_{n,m}| p_i(x^n)$$
$$\leq \underline{\lim}_k \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_{n,k} - \lambda_{n,m}| p_i(x^n) = \underline{\lim}_k q_i(y_k - y_m)$$

showing that $\lim y_m = y = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n$ in (A_1, τ_1) .

COROLLARY 2.3. Let A be a Fréchet algebra having a power series generator x. Then x generates a cyclic basis if and only if the topology of A is defined by a sequence of power series generator seminorms.

PROOF OF THEOREM 2.1: By the uniqueness of the formal power series expression and the fact that X is a power series generator for A, it follows that $\{X^n : n \in \mathbb{Z}^+\}$

is a cyclic basis for A. By Corollary 2.3, the Fréchet topology τ of A is defined by an increasing sequence (p_n) of power series generator seminorms; and for each $f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n X^n$ in A, we have $f = \lim_{k \to 0} \sum_{k=0}^{n} \lambda_k X^k$ in the topology τ . For each k, $\omega_k : \mathbb{Z}^+ \to [0, \infty), \ \omega_k(n) = p_k(x^n)$ define a separating sequence $\boldsymbol{\omega} = (\omega_k)$ of functions satisfying $\omega_k(n+m) \leq \omega_k(n)\omega_k(m), \ \omega_k(n) \leq \omega_{k+1}(n)$ for all $k \in \mathbb{N}$ all $n, m \in \mathbb{Z}^+$. Let

$$\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+,\boldsymbol{\omega}) := \bigg\{ f = \sum_{n=0}^\infty \lambda_n X^n \in \mathcal{F} : \sum_{n=0}^\infty |\lambda_n| \omega_k(n) < \infty \text{ for all } k \bigg\}.$$

Since each p_n is a power series generator seminorm, $A \subset \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$. In fact, $A = \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$. Let $f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n X^n \in \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$. Let $f_n = \sum_{k=0}^n \lambda_k X^k$. Since $X \in A$, each $f_n \in A$; and (f_n) is a Cauchy sequence in A. Thus $f \in A$.

Now we are left with the following possibilities:

- (a) All ω_k are weights.
- (b) No ω_k is a weight.
- (c) At least one ω_{k_0} fails to be a weight.

In the case (c), let $G = \{\omega_k : \omega_k \text{ is not a weight}\}$. If G is finite the corresponding p_k may be deleted, if G is infinite the corresponding p_k can be taken to define the topology so reducing consideration to the case (b). Assume (b). Then for each k, there is n such that $\omega_k(n) = 0$. Then for all $m \in \mathbb{Z}^+$, $\omega_k(n+m) \leq \omega_k(n)\omega_k(m) = 0$. It follows that for any $f \in \mathcal{F}$,

$$f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n X^n, \ \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| \omega_k(n) < \infty$$

for all k. Thus $A = \mathcal{F}$. This completes the proof.

REMARK 2.4. Let $(A, \|\cdot\|)$ be a normed algebra with a power series generator x. Let A^{\sim} be the completion of A. Then A^{\sim} need not be a Banach algebra having a power series generator x. Let $D = \{z \in \mathbb{C} : |z| \leq 1\}$. Let A(D) be the disc algebra consisting of functions continuous on D and holomorphic in the interior of D. It is a uniform Banach algebra with the supremum norm

$$||f||_{\infty} = \sup\left\{ \left| f(z) \right| : z \in D \right\}.$$

Let A be the subalgebra of A(D) consisting of all functions f whose Taylor series $f(z) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \left(f^{(n)}(0)/n! \right) z^n \text{ is absolutely convergent on the circle } \Gamma. \text{ For any } f \in A,$ $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{|f^{(n)}(0)|}{n!} \|z^n\|_{\infty} \leq \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{|f^{(n)}(0)|}{n!} \|z\|_{\infty}^n \leq \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{|f^{(n)}(0)|}{n!} < \infty.$

This shows that z is a power series generator for the normed algebra $(A, \|\cdot\|_{\infty})$. Since A contains polynomials in z, it follows from the Mergelyan Theorem that A is dense in A(D) which is identified with the completion of A. However, z is not a power series generator for A(D). Indeed, suppose that z is a power series generator for A(D). Then for any $f \in A(D)$, the Taylor series of f is absolutely convergent on D. Also, since A(D) is semisimple, the complete norms

$$||f||_{\infty} = \sup\left\{|f(z)|: z \in D\right\}$$

and

$$||f|| = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{|f^{(n)}(0)|}{n!} ||z^{n}||_{\infty}$$

are equivalent. Thus for some M > 0, $||f|| \leq M ||f||_{\infty}$ for all $f \in A(D)$. Hence, if $s_m(f)$ is the m^{th} partial sum of the Taylor series of f, then

$$\left\|s_m(f)\right\|_{\infty} \leq \sum_{n=0}^{m} \frac{\left|f^{(n)}(0)\right|}{n!} \|z^n\|_{\infty} \leq \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{\left|f^{(n)}(0)\right|}{n!} \|z^n\|_{\infty} = \|f\| \leq M \|f\|_{\infty}$$

for all m and all $f \in A(D)$. This contradicts a classical result that there exists a $f \in A(D)$ with $||s_m(f)||_{\infty} \ge |s_m(f)(1)| = O(\log m)$ (see [9, p. 264]). Note that A(D) is a Banach algebra of power series which is not a power series generated Banach algebra.

PROPOSITION 2.5. Let $(A, \|\cdot\|)$ be a normed algebra with a power series generator x. Let A^{\sim} be the completion of A. Then x is a power series generator for A^{\sim} if there exists a power series generator norm $|\cdot|$ on A equivalent to $\|\cdot\|$.

PROOF: Given $y = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n$ in A, let $|\cdot|$ be a power series generator norm on A equivalent to $||\cdot||$. Then $|y| = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| |x^n|$. Now let $y \in A^{\sim}$. Choose a sequence

$$y_k = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_{k,n} x^n, |y_k| = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_{k,n}| |x^n|$$

such that $|y_k - y| \rightarrow 0$. Now

$$\sup_{n\in\mathbb{Z}^+}|\lambda_{k,n}-\lambda_{l,n}||x^n|\leqslant\sum_{n=0}^\infty|\lambda_{k,n}-\lambda_{l,n}||x^n|=|y_k-y_l|\to 0$$

shows that there exists a scalar sequence $(\lambda_n)_{n \in \mathbb{Z}^+}$ such that $\lambda_{k,n} x^n \to \lambda_n x^n$ uniformly over n. Then

$$\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| |x^n| = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lim_k |\lambda_{k,n}| |x^n| \leq \underline{\lim}_k \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_{k,n}| |x^n| = \underline{\lim}_k |y_k| < \infty$$

showing that $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n \in A^{\sim}$ and $\left| y_k - \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n \right| \to 0$. Hence $y = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n$. This completes the proof.

3. Arens-Michael Decomposition

Let us recall the Arens-Michael decomposition defined by a sequence (p_k) of submultiplicative seminorms defining the topology τ of a Fréchet algebra A. We take $p_1 \leq p_2 \leq p_3 \leq \ldots$. For each k, let $N_k = \{x \in A : p_k(x) = 0\}$ an ideal. Let A_k be the completion of A/N_k in the norm $||x + N_k||_k = p_k(x)$. Then $\pi_k(x + N_{k+1}) = x + N_k(x \in A)$ extends as a norm decreasing surjective homomorphism $\pi_k : A_{k+1} \to A_k$ such that

$$A_1 \xleftarrow{\pi_1} A_2 \xleftarrow{\pi_2} A_3 \longleftarrow \ldots \longleftarrow A_k \xleftarrow{\pi_k} A_{k+1} \longleftarrow \ldots$$

is an inverse limit sequence of Banach algebras; and bicontinuously $A = \lim_{k \to \infty} A_k$. This is called the *Arens-Michael decomposition* of A ([5]). This is the basic tool for studying Fréchet algebras.

Let A be a Fréchet algebra of power series. Let τ denote the topology of coordinatewise convergence of \mathcal{F} . We call a seminorm p on A closable if for any p-Cauchy sequence (f_k) in A, $f_k \to 0$ in τ implies that $p(f_k) \to 0$. We define p to be of type (E) if given $m \in \mathbb{Z}^+$, there exists $c_m > 0$ such that $|\pi_m(f)| \leq c_m p(f)$ for all $f \in A$ ([7, 8]). A seminorm of type (E) is a norm.

PROPOSITION 3.1. Let A be a Fréchet algebra of power series. Let p be a continuous submultiplicative seminorm on A. Let ker $p = \{f \in A : p(f) = 0\}$. Let A_p be the completion of A/ker p in the norm $||f + \ker p||_p = p(f)$. Then the following are equivalent.

- (i) p is a norm and A_p is a Banach algebra of power series.
- (ii) p is closable and of type (E).

PROOF: (ii) implies (i). Since p is of type (E), p is a norm and each π_m is *p*-continuous. By continuity, the inclusion $(A, p) \hookrightarrow \mathcal{F}$ extends to a continuous homomorphism $\phi : A_p \to \mathcal{F}$. Let $f \in \ker \phi$. Choose a sequence (f_n) in A such that $p(f_n - f) \to 0$. Hence (f_n) is *p*-Cauchy. By the continuity of ϕ , $\phi(f_n) = f_n \to \phi(f) = 0$. Then $f_n \to 0$ in \mathcal{F} . By the closability, $p(f_n) \to 0$. Thus f = 0 and A_p is a subalgebra of \mathcal{F} . Thus A_p is a Banach algebra of power series.

(i) implies (ii). That A_p is a Banach algebra of power series implies that for each $m \in \mathbb{Z}^+$, there exists $c_m > 0$ such that for all $f \in A$, $|\pi_m(f)| \leq c_m p(f)$. Also, let $(f_n) \subset A$ be such that $f_n \to 0$ in (\mathcal{F}, τ) and $p(f_n - f_m) \to 0$. Then for some $f \in A_p$,

 $p(f_n - f) \to 0$; and so $f_n \to f$ in (\mathcal{F}, τ) , A_p being a Banach algebra of power series. Thus f = 0; and (ii) follows.

COROLLARY 3.2. Let $A = \lim_{k \to k} A_k$ be the Arens-Michael decomposition of a Fréchet algebra of power series A. Assume that each p_k is a norm. Then each A_k is a Banach algebra of power series if and only if each p_k is a closable and of type (E).

COROLLARY 3.3. Let A be a subalgebra of \mathcal{F} containing X which is a Banach algebra with a norm $\|\cdot\|$. Then A is a Banach algebra of power series if and only if $\|\cdot\|$ is closable and of type (E).

It is readily seen that a Fréchet algebra of power series A satisfies Loy's condition (E) in [8] (that is, for some $c_m > 0$, $(c_m^{-1}\pi_m)$ is equicontinuous) if and only if A admits a continuous norms of type (E) if and only if the topology of A is defined by a sequence of seminorms of type (E). Hence Corollary 3.2 gives the following from [7, 8]. Note that a Beurling-Fréchet algebra $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \boldsymbol{\omega})$ defined by a sequence of weights is expressible as an inverse limit of a sequence of Banach algebras of power series.

COROLLARY 3.4. Let A be the Beurling-Fréchet algebra $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$ defined by a sequence ω of weights on \mathbb{Z}^+ . The following hold.

- (1) A has a unique Fréchet space topology as a topological algebra.
- (2) Every derivation on A is continuous
- (3) A surjective homomorphism $\phi : B \to A$ from a Fréchet algebra B is continuous.

It is instructive to exhibit the Arens-Michael decomposition of \mathcal{F} defined by (p_k) , $p_k\left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\lambda_n X^n\right) = \sum_{n=0}^{k} |\lambda_n|$. One has $N_k = X^{k+1}\mathcal{F}$; and $A_k \cong \ell^1\left(\mathbb{Z}^+_{(k)}\right)$, the convolution algebra on the finite semigroup $\mathbb{Z}^+_{(k)} = \{0, 1, 2, \dots, k-1\}$ with addition modulo k. Certainly, it is not a subalgebra of $\mathcal{F} = \lim_{k \to \infty} \ell^1\left(\mathbb{Z}^+_{(k)}\right)$. The role of closability, in Proposition 3.1, is revealed by the following, whose proof we omit.

LEMMA 3.5. Let $(A, \|\cdot\|)$ be a normed algebra of power series continuously embedded in \mathcal{F} . Then the completion A^{\sim} is a Banach algebra of power series if and only if $\|\cdot\|$ is closable.

Being an inverse limit of finite dimensional algebras, \mathcal{F} is a nuclear Fréchet space. The following gives another class of such algebras. It also exhibits a significant difference between Banach algebras and Fréchet algebras at the level of power series generated uniform algebras. This is in view of the facts that (i) there exists an infinite dimensional uniform Banach algebra having a power series generator [1, Proposition 4]; and that (ii) a nuclear Banach space is finite dimensional (Dvoretzky-Rogers Theorem). In the following, the topological algebraic property of being a uniform algebra forces the linear topological property of nuclearity.

THEOREM 3.6. Let A be a uniform Fréchet algebra with a power series generator. Suppose that A is not a Banach algebra. Then A is a nuclear space.

PROOF: Let (p_k) be as above. Then $p_k(f^n) = p_k(f)^n$ for all $k \in \mathbb{N}$ all $n \in \mathbb{Z}^+$ and for all $f \in A$. Let x be a power series generator for A. Let $r_k = p_k(x)$. Then (r_k) is an increasing sequence of non-negative numbers such that given $n \in \mathbb{N}$, there exists $k \in \mathbb{N}$ satisfying $r_k^n > 0$. Now each $f \in A$ is of the form $f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n$ with

$$\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| r_k^n = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| p_k(x)^n = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n| p_k(x^n) < \infty$$

for each k. The functions $\omega_k(n) = r_k^n (n \in \mathbb{Z}^+)$ satisfy $\omega_k(n+m) = \omega_k(n) \omega_k(m)$, so that $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$ is a power series space $\wedge (\{\omega_k\})$ in the sense of [10, Chapter 6]. The map

$$\theta: \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega) \to A, \ \theta\left(\sum_{n=0}^\infty \lambda_n X^n\right) = \sum_{n=0}^\infty \lambda_n x^n$$

is a surjective homomorphism such that for each k,

$$p_k\left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\lambda_n x^n\right) \leqslant \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\lambda_n|\omega_k(n)$$

Thus θ is continuous; and $A \cong \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \boldsymbol{\omega}) / \ker \theta$, a homeomorphic isomorphism in view of the Open Mapping Theorem. Since (r_k) is an increasing sequence, it follows from the Grothendieck-Pietsch criterion ([10, Theorem 6.1.2, p. 98]) that $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \boldsymbol{\omega})$ is nuclear. Since nuclearity is preserved under quotient ([10, Proposition 5.1.3, p. 86]), A is nuclear. This completes the proof.

This recaptures the classical results that the algebras H(U) and \mathbb{E} are nuclear. More generally, it follows from [10, Theorem 6.1.3, p. 99] that a Beurling-Fréchet algebra $\ell(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$ is nuclear if and only if $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega) = \ell^{\infty}(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$. Thus the algebra $A^{\infty}(\Gamma)$ is nuclear. Given weights $\omega = (\omega_k)$, $A(D, \omega)$ (and analogously $H^{\infty}(U, \omega)$ or $H(U, \omega)$) is nuclear if and only if for each $f \in A(D, \omega)$,

$$\sup_{n}\left\{\frac{\left|f^{(n)}(0)\right|}{n!}\omega_{k}(n)\right\}<\infty$$

for each k. The homomorphism θ of the above proof is used to prove the following supplements of Theorem 2.1 and [6, Chapter III, Section 7]. It also provides a Fréchet algebra analogue of [1, Theorem 1]. We say that x satisfies condition (*) if

(i) $\exists M_1 > 0, M_2 > 0$ and for each k, there exists $m_k \in \mathbb{N}$ such that

$$M_1 n^{m_k} \leqslant p_k(x^n) \leqslant M_2 n^{m_k} \ \forall \ n \in \mathbb{Z}^+ \setminus \{0\}$$

and

(ii) $\exists n_0 \in \mathbb{N}$ such that $\{p_k(x^{n_0}) : k \in \mathbb{N}\}$ is unbounded.

THEOREM 3.7. Let A be a Fréchet algebra having a power series generator x. The following hold

- (1) Either sp (x) is totally disconnected or A is isomorphic to $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$ for a sequence ω of weight functions on \mathbb{Z}^+ .
- (2) Suppose that sp(x) is not totally disconnected and A is semisimple. Then the following hold.
 - (i) If A is a Q-algebra, and if x satisfies condition (*), then A is isomorphic to A[∞](Γ).
 - (ii) If A is not a Q-algebra, then A is isomorphic to either H(U) or \mathbb{E} .

PROOF: In the notations of the proof of Theorem 3.6, let $\omega_k(n) = p_k(x^n)$, $r_k = \inf_{n \in \mathbb{Z}^+} \omega_k(n)^{1/n}$, $r = \sup_{k \in \mathbb{N}} r_k$. Suppose there is

$$f = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n X^n \in \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \boldsymbol{\omega})$$

such that

$$\theta(f) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n x^n = 0.$$

Then the power series $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n z^n$ is absolutely convergent on every compact subset of $U_r = \{z \in \mathbb{C} : |z| < r\}$. Hence $f(z) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n z^n$ defines an analytic function on the region U_r , and f(x) = 0. Thus sp $(x) \subset Z_{U_r}(f)$ the zero set of f in U_r . Now r = 0 if and only if sp $(x) = \{0\}$ if and only if A is local. Suppose $r \neq 0$. Now either f = 0 or $Z_{U_r}(f)$ is a countable set consisting of isolated points, hence sp(x) totally disconnected. Thus either sp(x) is totally disconnected, in which case $A \cong \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega) / \ker \theta$; or $\lambda_n = 0$ for all n, so that f = 0, and θ is one-one. In this case, $A \cong \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$. Notice that r > 0 if and only if $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega)$ is semisimple. This proves (1).

Now assume that sp (x) is not totally disconnected and that A is semisimple. Then the Gelfand space M(A) is homeomorphic to sp (x). Now, for each k, $\overline{U_{r_k}} \subset$ sp (x); hence $U_r \subset$ sp $(x) = \bigcup_{k=1}^{\infty} \overline{U}_{r_k} \subset \overline{U}_r$. Thus if $r \neq r_k$ for any k, then sp $(x) = U_r$; if $r = r_k$ for some k, then sp $(x) = \overline{U}_r$. Hence sp $(x) = U_r$ or \overline{U}_r . Notice that by [11, Theorem 1] sp (x) is compact if and only if A is a Q-algebra. As in the proof of Theorem 2.1, eithr $A \cong \mathcal{F}$; or each ω_k is a weight, so that $A \cong \bigcap_{k=1}^{\infty} \ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega_k)$, hence

$$M(A) \cong \bigcup_{k=1}^{\infty} M(\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega_k)) \cong \bigcup_{k=1}^{\infty} \overline{U}_{r_k}.$$

Further by [4, p. 120] $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega_k) \cong A(\overline{U}_{r_k}, \omega_k)$, where

$$A(\overline{U}_{r_k},\omega_k) = \left\{ f \in C(\overline{U_{r_k}}) : f \in H(U_{r_k}), \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \left| \frac{f^{(n)}(0)}{n!} \right| \omega_k(n) < \infty \right\}.$$

Indeed, the Gelfand transform

$$y = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n X^n \to \widehat{y}, \ \widehat{y}(z) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda_n z^n \left(z \in \overline{U_{r_k}} \right)$$

establishes the isomorphim $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z}^+, \omega_k) \cong A(\overline{U}_{r_k}, \omega_k)$. Thus $A \cong \lim_{\leftarrow} A(\overline{U}_{r_k}, \omega_k)$. Suppose A fails to be a Q-algebra. If $r = \infty$, then $A \cong \lim_{\leftarrow} A(\overline{U}_{r_k}, \omega_k) = \mathbb{E}$. If $0 < r < \infty$, then $A = \lim_{\leftarrow} A(\overline{U}_{r_k}, \omega_k) = H(U_r)$ topologically as well. In view of the Riemann Mapping Theorem, U_r can be replaced by U_1 . This proves (ii). Finally to prove (i), assume that A is a Q-algebra. Hence $M(A) \cong \overline{U_r} \cong \overline{U_1}$. By condition (*)(i), there exists $n_0 \in \mathbb{N}$ such that $\{p_k(x^{n_0}) : k \in \mathbb{N}\}$ is unbounded; and by condition $(*)(i), m_k \to \infty$. Thus $y \in A$ if and only if the Gelfand transform $\widehat{y} = f$ for some function $f \in C(\Gamma)$ having Fourier series $f = \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} \widehat{f}(n)e^{in\theta}$ such that $\widehat{f}(n) = 0$ for all $n \leq -1$ and

$$\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |\widehat{f}(n)| n^{m_k} < \infty$$

for all $k \in \mathbb{N}$ by condition (*) (i). This happens if and only if $f \in A^{\infty}(\Gamma)$.
