The Ince Blundell Collection of Classical Sculpture

Volume 1, The Portraits Part 2, The Male Portraits

Despite its size and importance, the Ince Blundell Collection of Classical Sculpture has never been completely catalogued or published. Part 1 provided a detailed study of the female portraits. Now Jane Fejfer gives an equally detailed and illuminating study of the much larger number of male portraits. This work is a vital reference for anyone studying classical sculpture.

Liverpool was the first English provincial city in the eighteenth century to hold art exhibitions. Its midnineteenth century exhibitions were notable for attracting Pre-Raphaelite and foreign artists who both had difficulty in showing their works in London. Their development and eventual collapse reveal the importance of municipal enterprise and official subsidy, of the free market and cash flow, of artistic feuds and the battle of styles in the growth of provincial culture.
