



THE POTOSI KILLIFISH *Megupsilon aporus* is known only from one isolated spring in Mexico, at El Potosí, Nuevo León. By 1976 it had become rare owing to the introduction of the predatory large-mouthed bass in the spring in 1974. At the request of Dr R. R. Miller, Chairman of the SSC Freshwater Fish Group, the Oryx 100% Fund gave £250 for removing the bass, and 66 were removed in the first attempt. The killifish is now thriving.
