The journal seeks to provide an unprejudiced forum for historical dialogue and debate as well as to stimulate an increased international awareness and original research in the history of the Arctic and Antarctic. Although the journal is essentially scholarly, it intends to be entertaining. It is hoped that original submissions of a minimum length of 2500 words will be both quantitative and qualitative enough as to permit at least ten such articles to be published in each issue. The contributors of the journal's first ten major articles (2500 + words) shall receive a free lifetime subscription to the journal. Short pieces (500 + words) are also encouraged.
