In preparing another *Proceedings* issue for publication, it becomes increasingly clear what a bonus it is for the *Association* to be able to rely on a network of member expertise and access to officials in high places in different parts of the world, in order to organize not only the local arrangements, but also the intellectual content of the annual *IALL Courses on International Law Librarianship*.
