CORRECTION

The Editor has received the following communication from Nathaniel H. Leff:

"Albert Fishlow has pointed out to me an error in my article which appeared in the September 1969 issue of The Journal of Economic History.

On page 476, there appears a sentence:

"The average annual increase in production in the period 1914-1918 was 4.3 percent."

This should be replaced with one reading:

"Following the recovery from the recession year of 1914, over the entire period 1915-1918, output increased only 6 percent."

The source for this statement is the same as cited in my original n.12. I might add that this correction strengthens rather than weakens the article's interpretation of the effects of World War I on Brazilian industrialization."
