The author devotes special attention to the cults and myths of the ancient Egyptians and shows that the late, organized state-religion has been allowed to obscure the far older beliefs from which it evolved.

The story of Eastern Iran and Northern India under Greek rule, treated not as part of the history of India, as it has always been, but restored to its proper place in Hellenistic history.
