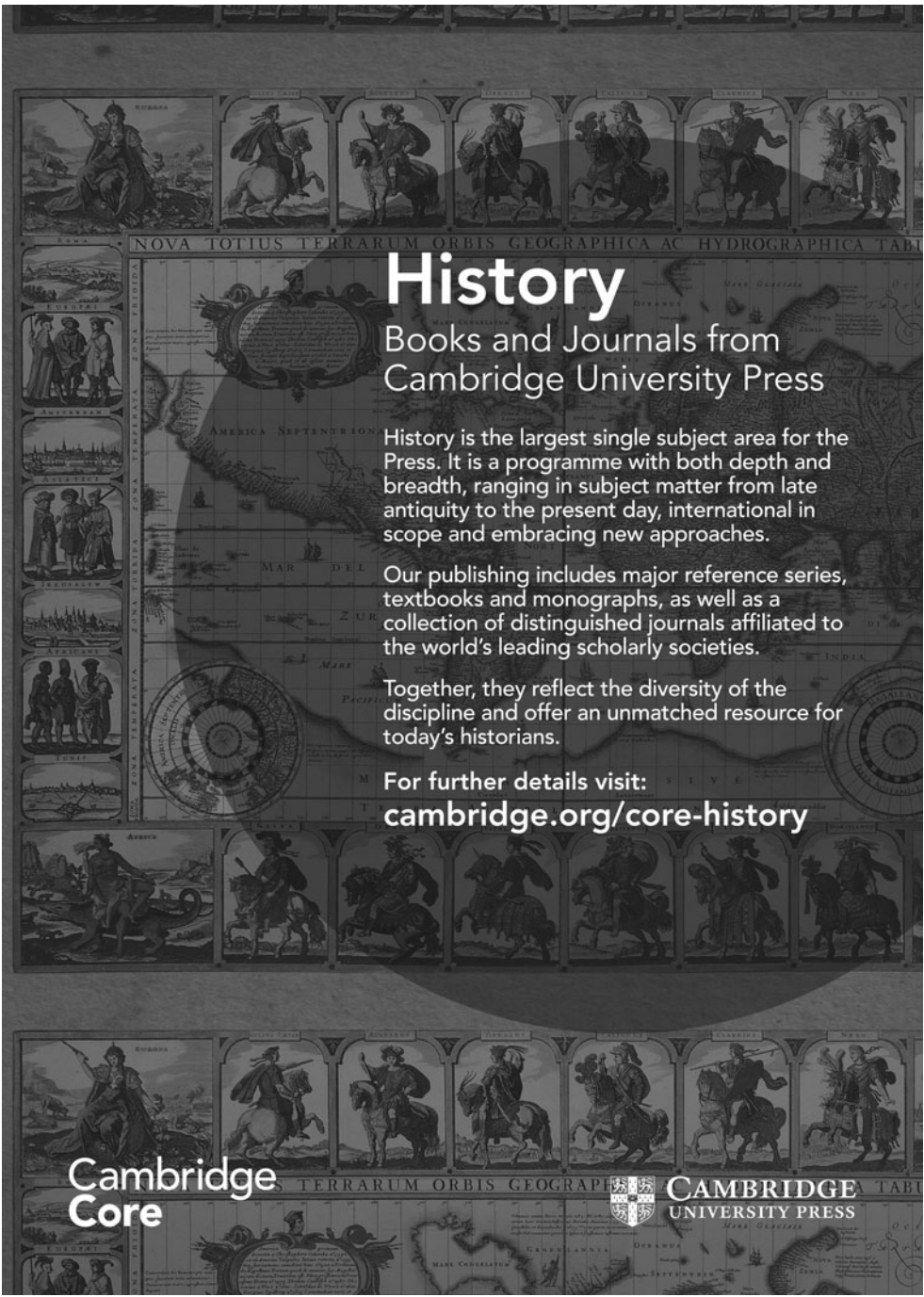

Central European History publishes articles, review articles, book reviews, and other forms of scholarly writing dealing with the history of German-speaking Central Europe. The journal welcomes manuscripts using all approaches to history and dealing with all historical periods, from the medieval era to the present. The journal aims to be the primary venue for scholarly exchange and debate among scholars of the history of Central Europe. As such, all topics and approaches to history are welcome: cultural, social, political, diplomatic, intellectual, economic, and military history, as well as historiography and methodology. Because space is limited, articles that have been or soon will be published elsewhere are not accepted. Manuscripts submitted to *CEH* should not be under consideration by another journal pending decision of the editor on publication. If it is learned that an article is under submission to another journal while being considered at *CEH*, consideration will cease immediately. Unsolicited book reviews are not accepted.

All article manuscripts should be submitted via ScholarOne (<https://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/ccc>). Authors should please take care to remove any information that might identify them as author, and follow the prompts in ScholarOne to make their manuscripts anonymous. The entire text of all manuscripts, including footnotes and headings, must be prepared in double-spaced typescript with generous margins to allow for copyediting. Footnotes must be numbered consecutively.

All materials will be edited to conform with *The Chicago Manual of Style* in matters of punctuation, capitalization, and format. Final decisions on style remain with the editor.
