In 1193 two brothers, Soga Jūrō and Soga Gōro, avenged the death of their father by attacking and slaying his murderer, Kudō Suketsune, an important advisor to Shogun Minamoto Yoritomo. This tale of revenge became an important part of the oral literature of Japan, and later was used again and again by playwrights of Japan's great traditional theaters.
