Notes for contributors

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The Editors welcome submission of articles for consideration. The length required for articles is normally 9–12,000 words, articles over 12,000 words will only be considered if there is a clear rationale for the extra length. These are also sent to independent referees. The *Review* is a refereed journal, and contributors should allow time for the process of refereeing to take place. It is the author's responsibility to provide the editors with an accurate total word count for all articles on submission.
