

He argues that the most important moral problem in finance is not the 'greed is good' culture, but rather the epistemic shortcomings of bankers, clients, rating agencies and regulators. Drawing on insights from economics, psychology and philosophy, de Bruin develops a novel theory of epistemic virtue, linking it to behavioural economics. He then applies this to business and finance contexts like racist and sexist lending practices, CEO hubris and regulatory outsourcing of epistemic responsibility. *Ethics and the Global Financial Crisis* contributes valuable new insights into epistemology, virtue ethics and economics.
